Schedule Online Now! When you're a kid, choices get made for you. When you're a son of an only child and an orphan in the small-town '60s, holiday calculus is easy. People come to you. Things happen at your house. Your mother is in charge.

Later, things get more complicated. I have an appetite for control and my own food, and cooking is my favorite hobby, so I'm inclined to coerce the extended family to come to me. But I understand the imperative (to at least attempt) to subscribe to the principles of democracy where major holidays are concerned. So, over the years, Thanksgiving has come in several forms. Trips to California for in-law buffets. Relatively small gatherings at my mother's table. A blended group at a club. And, of course, me in my kitchen making too many courses and too much mess.

When your kids are no longer children (except in your distorted mind's eye) and they take mates, all bets are off. You hope they choose you...your house...your traditions; you recognize feeling this way is selfish so you try to suppress it; you experience guilt at the slightest hint of resentment that you are no longer the sun around which orbit the planets of your domain; and, ultimately, you take and celebrate what you get. Which is made easier and more palatable when you genuinely appreciate and adore the new additions to your sacred family core (and I do).

My mom reluctantly ceded control of the holidays a couple of decades ago. Still, old habits die hard. "I'm getting the turkey," she texts me and/or the kids at some point every year. It takes several iterations and various versions of "no" to land on something simpler for everyone. "Okay. At least I'll make a dessert." (These sweet treats – think Greek wedding cookies and gooey brownies – are always sinfully and addictively good.)

Some families like to eat Thanksgiving dinner early — we are among them, or so we identify. But "early" means different things to different people. My parents would be happy with noon. My girls prefer to be in the middle of a many-mile walk at that hour (and so do I.) Five is "early" for most of us. Three sits right in the middle. Somehow, we usually land on 4.

This year, we will replicate a plan that has found temporary permanence for our group. My daughters are flying in from their respective cities and cooking for everyone at our house. I like this solution, even though it relieves me of the pleasures associated with my duties as

chef. The girls are excellent cooks. They are thoughtful entertainers. Jenna has a terrific eye and talent for creating the physical setting and a welcoming mood, and the three of them work together well. It's fun and heartwarming to sit back and watch it unfold.

With age comes both wisdom and acceptance. But neither comes easy nor without reversions to stubborn stupidity, at times. The fundamental truth worth remembering when we plan for the holidays: It's not as much the when or where or what as it is the who. I'm fortunate to have both my parents close by, and Jenna's here, too. I'm blessed to have daughters with whom I'm close. I'm happy about the young men they have chosen. I'm very grateful for a loving and fun-to-be-with wife. When the time comes, I'll be over-the-moon thankful for my grandchildren. It won't much matter who cooks.

> Oscar F. Mayer and his brother Gottfried launched the Oscar Mayer Company in 1883 in Chicago. In 1936, Gottfried's son, Carl, designed the company's first vehicle, known by different names until "Wienermobile" was coined in 1951, when it began visiting stores, schools, and public events. The advent of molded fiberglass opened new possibilities in fabrication, allowing the vehicle to adopt its classic

hot-dog-in-a-bun appearance.

In 1988, company representatives began visiting college campuses, recruiting upcoming graduates for a one-year tour of duty driving the Wienermobile. Isaac was a marketing major at the University of Texas - Rio Grande Valley, deep in the heart of Texas, when he attended an info session during his sophomore year. "They explained what the job was like, being able to drive the Wienermobile all over the country. I thought, 'Man, this is something I want to do.' They came back my senior year, the semester before I graduated, and I applied."

Earning a degree in public relations or a related discipline helps, but Maggie and Isaac agree it's a range of ingredients that make the real difference. "Any degree is good for the Wienermobile," says Isaac. "We have someone who majored in interior design, and another hotdogger finished their master's inside the Wienermobile in leadership

"It's about what you bring to the table," adds Maggie. While studying advertising at the University of Tennessee, she learned about the position online and was immediately intrigued. "Everything I read about it...I was immediately hooked. It checked all my boxes."

She submitted a resumé and cover letter online, adding a video to showcase who she is off-paper, and to set her apart from other applicants. "After a couple of months of interviews, I was lucky enough to cut the mustard," Maggie says.

Oscar Mayer grills thousands of candidates, but only 12 are cho-

sen to drive the six Wienermobiles. Those lucky dogs are sent to Hot Dog High in Wisconsin, where they refine their knowledge of the Oscar Mayer brand and polish their driving skills to suit the oversized vehicle. "It's the coolest post-grad job I could ever think of," Maggie says. "You get to travel the country. There's no better way to see it than through this custom windshield."

Isaac adds, "Everything about the Wienermobile is so custom, it's

an amalgamation." The engine is Chevy, but the chassis is from a box truck, like those used by UPS. Its taillights match a Camaro's, and the outside door handle is from a Silverado tailgate. Adding to the nostalgic charm of the Wienermobile is its jingle horn, which plays

the beginning of the Oscar Mayer song.

The festive interior offers seating for six, in a red and yellow color scheme with custom embroidery. The ketchup-colored floor features a mustard-styled stripe, and the ceiling is a blue sky, "Because it's always blue skies in the Wienermobile, even on rainy days," explains Maggie.

The ceiling also features a "bunroof" - a transparent hatch above the front seats. Maggie says, "It's totally removable, so if we do parade or something like that, one of us will drive and the other can sit on top of the ve-

The rear of the vehicle has an A/V system to play music and display videos and photos during appearances. "And that door back there," Maggie says, pointing to a compartment in the far rear, "is our storage closet, where we keep everything we need to travel.

It also may have a hot dog hot tub, but we can't really confirm or deny that."

Individual Wienermobiles are identified by their license plates. Others in the fleet are YUMMY, WEENR, OSCRMYR, OUR-DOG, and RELSHME. For Maggie and Isaac, their Wienermobile - BIG BUN - is less than two months old. "Hot off the grill," Isaac proclaims.

"It's pretty special," Maggie says. "This is the first new car I've ever had."

Each team of hotdoggers is assigned to a region of the country, covering about 500 miles per week. "We're the Southeast team," explains Isaac. "We can go anywhere from Virginia down to Florida and some of the inland states. After about six months, we'll switch and move into a completely new region, maybe the East or West, and we'll get a new partner as well."

A Wienermobile's itinerary is determined by requests filtered through the "Where's the Party?" page on the Oscar Mayer website. The company provides drivers with all the support they need during their year on the road, cov-

ering the cost of gas and lodging, and providing an allowance for meals and other travel expenses. "We 'ketchup' pretty often with the home office and the other hotdoggers," Maggie jokes.

Sadly, the Wienermobile isn't set up to serve hot dogs to visitors. Instead, everyone who visits the Wienermobile receives a wiener whistle, a memento of the American icon on wheels. "It's kind of like a lifetime hot dog," says Isaac.

In the 1950s, the whistles were included in packages of Oscar Mayer products. "People get very excited for them," says Maggie. "It's your 'I saw it' token. You can only get one when you see the Wienermobile in person."

The hotdoggers may also distribute prizes, such as coupons, stickers, or other wienermobilia. They sometimes set up a tent with activities, such as sending a postcard from the Wienermobile or "Guess the Whistles," where you guess the number of wiener whistles in a jar. "We hang out, we take pictures, we have fun," Maggie adds.

trunk-or-treat with his 4-year-old grandson was thrilled with the nostalgia of the Wienermobile. "It's amazing," he said. "I'm 63, and this brings back so many memories of when I was kid."

Listening to the Wienermobile's horn play the iconic Oscar Mayer jingle, the man enthusiastically sang along. "I'm going to have to teach you the words," he told his grandson.

Maggie and Isaac relish the variety of experiences they've had as hotdoggers - not only touring the country in the Wienermobile but also serving as a boots-on-the-ground marketing team and meeting fans. "It's one of the best parts of the gig. People are always so excited – taking pictures, waving, honking their horns. That's our work; this is our job," Maggie says. "How lucky are we to be stewards that get to do that? More people have been to space than have gotten to drive the Wienermobile. I don't see how it could get better than this. I don't think it will, but we'll get to carry this with us for the rest of our lives."

Seeing Signs Your Love One Needs a Little Help

very year around the holidays, I hear the same thing from families: "Mom seemed fine on the phone — but when I saw her in person, I knew something was different."

The holidays offer us a chance to see our loved ones up close. Between the laughter, cooking, and family stories, you might notice small things that don't feel quite right. These moments can be gentle signals that your parent or loved one could use a little extra help at home.

Here's what to look for when you visit this season:


- A home that feels "different." Look around the house. Is it cluttered, dusty, or unsafe to move around in? Are appliances left on or things left undone? Sometimes a once-tidy home becoming disorganized is the first visible sign that your loved one needs extra hands.
- Changes in appearance or hygiene. - Medication confusion. When I visit clients, I often find multiple pill bottles for the same medication or missed refills. It's easy to get mixed up, especially when prescriptions change. A care manager can step in to organize medications, set up a simple system, and make sure doses are taken correctly.
- Bruises, mobility issues, or "little trips." If you notice bruises, scuffed furniture, or hear, "Oh, I just tripped," take it seriously. Falls are one of the biggest risks for older adults, and they're often preventable. With the right support, physical therapy, and home safety changes, you can dramatically reduce the risk.
- Withdrawal or isolation. Maybe Dad skipped his weekly card game, or Mom doesn't want to attend church anymore. When older

I shop for food almost every day. Most times, I don't know what I'm going to make until I get to the store and see what looks good or interesting. The menu reveals itself to me as I inspect the produce or ponder the selection of meats at the butcher's counter. Often, I land on an idea that is a repeat or derivative of something I've done many times before. Occasionally, though, I take a shot in the dark. When it hits, it's the most fun you can have in the kitchen.

This is the product of one such shot. Stored somewhere in my sub-conscious, I had a good feeling about the compatibility between sausage and squash. I can't summon specifics, but the subliminal notion inspired me, and I coupled it with a craving for soup. When I spotted a head of particularly perky frisee, the concept congealed in my mind. The recipe that follows is the (very tasty) result.

As always, amounts are suggestions; these are approximations of my first try at a dish that I intend to make again...and I'll probably do it a bit differently the second time, and each time after that.

- 1 sweet onion, roughly diced
- 1 fennel bulb, roughly chopped
- 2 carrots, roughly chopped
- 4 celery stalks, roughly chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, roughly minced
- 2 acorn squash, peeled, seeded, and cubed
- 1 ½ lbs Italian sausage (I used hot, but sweet works better if you don't like spicy food), cut into 1-½-inch pieces
- 1 head frisee or curly endive, coarsely chopped

- 2 32-oz cartons chicken broth, or similar amount of homemade
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 2 bay leaves

Grated nutmeg, to taste

Heaping handful of coarsely chopped Italian parsley

Salt and pepper, to taste

Heat olive oil over medium-high in a stock pot. Add sausage to brown on all sides and render some fat. Remove sausage and set aside. Add carrots, fennel, celery, and onion. Season well with salt and stir well. Sauté for 3 minutes. Reduce heat to medium. Add garlic and bay leaf, stir well and sauté for another minute. Add squash, season well with salt and nutmeg, stir everything well to incorporate, and sauté for five more minutes.

Add chicken broth to the pot, season, and increase temperature to high. When the broth begins to boil, decrease to medium-low, cover, and simmer for an hour.

Turn heat off. With a stick blender (or, in batches with a conventional blender), puree the soup. Add sausage and frisee, turn heat to medium, cover and cook for 15 minutes. Uncover, add parsley, reduce heat to medium-low, and simmer for 10 to 15 more minutes.

Serve or cool to room temperature and refrigerate to rewarm and enjoy when you feel like it.






As a child in his native Italy, my father had little formal education.

Unfortunately, he didn't account for the narrowness of the medieval lanes in the tiny hilltop town. The car sat outside the city walls and my father's family and friends curiously visited it like an animal in a zoo.

It's hard to talk about our kids and grandkids without sounding boastful. Our offspring have proven themselves to be very bright.







The Little Luxuries of Landings Life

uxury is an easy word to overuse. But on Skidaway Island, it isn't about chandeliers or brand names. It's the sound of the wind through the oaks, the stillness of the marsh at dusk, the way the air smells after rain. It's having enough time to notice it all. For those of us lucky enough to call Skidaway home, the real luxuries are quiet ones.

They're tucked into the rhythm of daily life and revealed slowly, like a secret the island only shares with people who stay long enough to listen. Mornings here have a tempo all their own. There's the hum of sprinklers, the buzz of golf course crews, someone chatting on a porch in the distance, and the low light turning the sky rose-gold.

Neighbors wave as they walk their dogs. We start to live by the light here. The sun, the tides, even the birds seem to set the schedule. People talk about slowing down, but that doesn't quite capture it. It's more about tuning in, hearing nature at night, noticing the color of the sky, recognizing the shape of your own days again.

There's an easy grace to life here that shows up in the details, not

just in homes, but in how people live. Dining tables sit near windows to catch the sunset. Porches double as living rooms. Flowers grow in clusters rather than rows, left to move with the breeze.

When you move here, you start making small changes without realizing it. You open the blinds more. You find yourself outside even when you don't need to be. The island trains you to intently look around. It's not about decorating a life; it's about designing a slower one.

Wildlife is part of our daily background. Great blue herons stand motionless in lagoons. You can hear the owls before you see them. Some mornings, dolphins glide through nearby waters like they own them, which, truthfully, they do. There's always that moment when you just stop and take it in. Even after years, it still happens.

You realize this is what people dream about when they picture a peaceful life. There's something grounding about being surrounded by nature that's still wild and unpredictable. The tides come and go

whether you're watching or not. The marsh shifts colors throughout the day. The island keeps its own time, and everyone eventually adjusts.

Skidaway's most underrated luxury might be the people who live here. Neighbors greet you whether you know them or not. Someone always seems to have a recommendation, a tool, or a laugh to share. It's the kind of place where a casual hello turns into a 20-minute chat, and where everyone knows everyone at Thursday night happy hour.

There's comfort in the way people look out for each other. We may come from different places; but, once you're here, that melts away. You find your people quickly. Belonging doesn't come from clubs or schedules; it comes from rhythm. Porch lights left on for late walkers. The "two-fingered" golf cart wave that means "Hey there, everything's ok." The quiet confidence of knowing that you're part of something steady.

Life here is filled with little rituals that are more important than, at first, they seem to be. Morning coffee on the porch. Afternoon biking. Evening golf cart rides. Even the weather contributes to the simple sense of wonder. A summer storm sends you searching for cover. Then, almost as quickly as it began, the rain eases, the birds return, and the air smells new again.

Luxury here isn't about big things, it's in the small ones. A glass of wine with friends. The quiet when you turn off your phone. The sense that you don't need to be anywhere else. The ordinary becomes memorable. That's what makes life here feel rare.

You can live here for years and still be caught off guard by a view, a sound, or a sky that feels impossibly wide. It's not the kind of beauty that demands attention; it's the kind that earns it. Over time, residents start building their days around it.

They are feelings – peace, time, belonging, beauty, safety, gratitude – the kind that can't be bought, only noticed.

Advanced Technology Enhances Cosmetic Surgery Results

osmetic surgery patients want to look better and younger, seeking treatments with minimal discomfort, reasonable pricing, and short recovery times. Plastic surgeons must thoroughly examine products and devices that claim to deliver such results to determine if they truly work for their practice goals. These devices include instruments that produce light beams like lasers, emit heat produced by radiofrequency or ultrasound, and other technologies.

Most such devices ablate (eliminate by vaporizing) and/or tighten skin, reduce fat pockets, resurface skin, reduce wrinkles, and - most importantly - stimulate new skin development by increasing production of collagen and elastin. The best and most effective results often require combinations of treatments, although improvement is visible after every session.


Everesse by Cartessa is a radiofrequency-producing device that both tightens and increases thickness of the skin. It's used for the face and neck, arms, knees, abdomen, and buttocks. Thicker skin wrinkles less than thin skin, so Everesse helps in that regard. Everesse genuinely works, and treatment does not re-

quire needles, numbing or pain. Discomfort is minimal, while high energy is used and a cooling head on the instrument soothes the skin during treatment.

Typically, with Everesse, one side of the face is treated, and the patient is given a mirror to compare the difference from the untreated side. The usual response is "OMG" or "Wow!" Then, the other side is treated. The usual treatment time for the face and neck is 30 minutes, and longer for larger areas.
