





nore my deadline. We launched this business - this magazine – with its debut issue at the beginning of September of 2003. It's the beginning of September of 2023 today. Groggy – I thought, "We're 20." Could it be? I did some infantile math. I wrote "03 - 04 = 1."

The Skinnie is a business, so doing its work is a job. But every person who has given or continues to give a part of him or herself to it does so when he or she probably could do something else. Not because of the "job" part, but because of commitment to a community and a city and the creative process. We are advocates for and partners with our advertiser-clients. We are your neighbors. 

Where the Past Is Present

dead...it isn't even past. Craig Barrow, the current generation in a long line of owner-residents whose ancestor Noble Jones journeyed to Georgia with James Oglethorpe, emphasizes that everything about the storied place called Wormsloe circles back to its preservation. Family-initiated efforts include the 1961 creation

of the Wormsloe Foundation; the 1973 gift of 1,400 acres to the State of Georgia; and a 15-acre allocation to the University of Georgia's Center for Research and Education at Wormsloe – all alongside a 50-acre tract Barrow and his father reserved for their family and its future generations.

Many Savannahians associate Wormsloe with that photogenic allée of historic oak trees, gateway to tabby ruins, marsh views, family burial sites, and the annual "Colonial Faire and Muster" (a must-do during February's Georgia History Festival). Yet the unpaved oak av-

enue is merely the entrance to an immensely larger preserve of Georgia heritage. A place where immense natural beauty is inexorably entangled with vestiges of some of the nation's ugliest truths.

"Pigeon Island and Long Island - they're part of Wormsloe," declares

William Faulkner supposedly said the Southern past isn't Barrow. "So is Diamond Causeway to the Landings." Meaning that Skidaway Island residents drive daily "through" Wormsloe, whether they realize it or not. Though the Landings justifiably celebrates a 50-year milestone, the greater Wormsloe site knocks on the door of a three-century mark, harkening to the foundation of Georgia. And even before that, Isle of Hope and Wormsloe (both English names) were the some-

> times-homes of indigenous people such as the Yamacraw Creeks - Tomochichi's clan that yielded Yamacraw Bluff to Oglethorpe to site Savannah in 1733.

> Oglethorpe's utopian social experiment may have been altruistic, and tight controls on land acquisition and inheritance and the prohibition of an enslaved labor force distinguished the colony from others like Carolina or Virginia. The first settlers in Georgia remained monetarily meek at best, despite their fresh start.

The unusual name Wormsloe – sometimes Wormslow - echoes Noble Jones's home in Herefordshire: Wormslow Hundred. Though some have theorized that the name could reference silkworms and Jones's failed attempt at sericulture, prevailing wisdom points to English namesakes, not abandoned agricultural antecedents.

On the subject of names . . . Noble Jones. Even a novelist might fail to

invent a more fitting name for the early Georgia figure. Its self-contradictory nature seems ironically appropriate. The surname, humble and common, was that of a carpenter who sailed on the ship Ann to a fledgling colony. Jones came to Georgia in the company of his wife and children, indicating his intention to lay roots in the 13th colony. Yet Noble Jones flourished in the new colony, first securing 500 acres (the maximum acquisition allowed, even for settlers paying their own way), then utilizing indentured labor to cultivate his land until slavery was legalized in 1749.

Then came enslaved people, with some estimates pegging their numbers around 1,500 at peak. Like so much history, the horrors associated with plantation slavery at sites like Wormsloe starkly contrast with benign elements like the former plantation's majestic oaks.

With his ambitious hunger for land (more and more arable acreage at Isle of Hope, plus city lots in Savannah), Noble Jones laid the groundwork to become Georgia "nobility," once Trustee-era strictures had passed. At its apex, Wormsloe comprised thousands of acres.

Under Oglethorpe's leadership, Noble Jones became valuable to military readiness against the Spanish in St. Augustine. Jones built a tabby structure at Wormsloe, part residence and part fortification – one of several strategic posts dotting the coast from Savannah to St. Mary's. Although the Spanish never ventured as far north as Wormsloe, Jones nevertheless headed a corps of Georgia Marines ready to repel the enemy. The tabby ruins of his fortified house stand testament to 18th Century building techniques and to geo-political dynamics among Europe's imperial nations that are difficult to imagine today.

The American Revolution divided families; the Joneses were a good example. Noble Jones, who died in 1775, was a King's man, while his son, Noble Wimberley Jones, was a Liberty Boy, party to a plot to commandeer gunpowder from a Savannah repository. In an expression of displeasure, Noble Jones resorted to bequeathing his estate to his daughter in a life trust, rather than directly to his son. Upon her death, however, Wormsloe reverted to her brother, the patriot.

Back in control, Noble Wimberley Jones re-established the patrilineal inheritance of Wormsloe by deeding the property to his son George Jones, who in the burgeoning American republic served as a U.S. Senator.

At home, he built a large plantation house in 1820 that remains the home of his descendants today. Under his hand, Wormsloe joined the ranks of major cotton-producing plantations across the South, realizing huge profits through accelerated land acquisition and the vast use of enslaved laborers.

Fourth-generation George Frederick Tilghman Jones (who changed the family name to DeRenne, a nod to his grandmother's maiden name, Van Deren) witnessed the nation's reckoning with the sectional crisis and slavery. As the Civil War raged and fighting finally came to Georgia, the Jones/DeRennes fled Wormsloe. After the war, President Lincoln's vision for knitting the country together might have made good the promises of emancipation and Sherman's Field Order No. 15 ("40 acres and a mule"). It's conceivable that Wormsloe might have been divided and redistributed, perhaps to the enslaved people who had worked its fields. But Lincoln's assassination and Andrew Johnson's conciliatory policies toward former Confederates allowed Wormsloe's refugees to return to their ancestral home and re-enter the coastal aristocracy – shaken perhaps, but back on their land.

The 20th Century witnessed predictable passage of the property at Wormsloe, generation to generation, as well as a renewed emphasis on publishing documents related to Georgia history. The DeRenne family's antiquarian proclivities ran parallel to those of the Georgia Historical Society, with whom the family published numerous historical pieces. George Wimberley Jones DeRenne built a separate structure just a few yards from the 1820s house: a 1906 Edwardian library. It could be called a folly, were it not for its sheer beauty and the importance of the volumes it holds. (Openings are rare, as the Barrows' home and library are private, yet Mr. Barrow and his wife are generous with their home when it comes



to hosting non-profit events.)

What does the future hold? Craig Barrow, speaking from his ninth-generation vantage, says that a new visitors' center, rising along Parkersburg Road, is due to open this fall. Visitors will have a more formalized experience, he says, as trams will carry them the 1.5-miles to the historic remains of Noble Jones's initial structure. Though there will be no more individual vehicular traffic on the unpaved path, Barrow emphasizes that

the "oak avenue will still be accessible to all – on foot, by bike," or on the trams from the visitors' center, where guests will receive historical narratives from trained guides.

As for the family, Barrow shares that his son harbors the preservation ethic that has passed through the generations. His inheritance will one day make a 10th generation on the site. Barrow joins other Savannahians in worrying about dramatic industrial development in previously bucolic

sections of Chatham County. But 1,400 acres of islands, marsh, and historic high land called Wormsloe? "That will be preserved forever."

Roger Smith is the director of the Learning Center, Savannah's premiere place for lifelong learning and a program of Senior Citizens, Inc. Formerly the director of education at the Georgia Historical Society, Smith infuses the histories of Savannah, Georgia, and the South into much of TLC's programming. √hrough a grant by the Landings Landlovers Foundation, Wilderness Southeast (WiSE) will provide kayaking safety and coastal ecology programs for Landings residents. "The kayaking and coastal ecology sessions for Landings residents will begin September 19," explains Lisa Goodman, executive director of WiSE. "We will leave from Delegal Creek Marina and may hold some sessions at Butterbean Beach."

Individuals and families are encouraged to attend. Cost will be \$65 per person, \$50 for ages 12 to 18.

During the off-season, Diana Churchill, WiSE's resident birding expert, will provide walking tours exploring the wonderful diversity of the birds on Skidaway Island. She is a longtime birder and author of the book, Bird's Eye View.

WiSE is an eco-tour and environmental education nonprofit organization that offers immersive opportunities led by expert guides and educators to explore Georgia's wild and relatively pristine coastal places. It tailors experiences for families, schools, and organized groups of all ages, allowing participants to connect with the environment. WiSE discovery trips include naturalist guides, logistics, and equipment to illuminate the magic of the Georgia Coast. WiSE was founded in 1973 by three Savannah friends - Dick and Joyce Murlless and John "Crawfish" Crawford. Its expressed mission has been to develop an awareness, appreciation, and understanding of the natural world, thus instilling a sense of stewardship. The founders believed that providing opportunities for people to experience nature would inspire them to learn more and to protect it. Before the terms "eco-tourism" and "eco-education" existed, WiSE was doing just that as pioneers in the field.

Throughout the years, WiSE has demonstrated its commitment to its mission through the implementation of two programs: educational eco-tours enabling participants to observe and experience the unique ecosystems of the Georgia Coast and Fish Gotta Swim© (FGS), a science-enrichment program for underserved youth.

In the coming years, WiSE plans to expand and transform its programming in an effort to increase its impact. "We are especially interested in expanding the FGS program by offering it to more schools, particularly to the 33 Title-1 schools in the Savannah Chatham County Public School System," Goodman explains.

FISH GOTTA SWIM

According to Goodman, the bi-monthly kayaking sessions will help raise money for FGS, which provides opportunities for at-risk students to participate in outdoor, hands-on learning. Since 2002, WiSE has provided more than 8,000

student hours annually of education to Savannah-Chatham County Public School students, serving mostly at-risk youth who may not have the opportunity to engage with nature in their daily lives. Despite proximity to the Georgia Coast, 75 percent of students served in the FGSprogram have never been to the beach or coastal wetlands. Parents are often unable to deliver experiences in nature due to economic and time constraints.



On October 7, WiSE will host a "Paddle Battle Party" to benefit FGS and celebrate its own 50th anniversary. Challengers 12 and older will compete in kayaks, paddleboards, and other non-motorized watercraft in 4-mile and 1-mile

races. Competition will take place from 3 to 5 p.m., followed by an award ceremony, food, live music, and a silent auction. Attendees will enjoy the premiere of "50 Years WiSE," a documentary produced in collaboration with SCAD students, to be aired on Georgia Public Broadcasting. The film profiles WiSE's three co-founders through interviews with them, as well as past staff members and program participants. It elaborates on WiSE's

The school and health systems have been working for months to enhance RHHS's certification programs. With the expansion of the new high school and its focus on the health sciences, the partnership is a logical development, but its scope extends outside the classroom. 

Raiders managed to eliminate most of the enemy and destroy two of their boats and two of their planes. American casualties included 18 Marines killed in action and 12 missing. The Raiders were unable to take any prisoners or collect any meaningful intelligence.

The assault was a successful test of Raider tactics and gave the American press corps something positive about which to report, boosting Allied morale. Such reports were important, especially during the early stages of the war when Allied victories were few and far between.

One incident from the Makin Island raid was particularly hard for Turner and his mates to stomach. Because of the extremely high and rough surf, nine Raiders were unable to return to the waiting submarines and their absence went unnoticed in the crowded quarters until the boats arrived back at Pearl Harbor. Meanwhile, with no food and little ammunition left, the missing Raiders believed a large group of Japanese troops remained on the island. The NCO in charge ordered his men to surrender, but they were not accorded the expected humane treatment of prisoners of war. Instead, they were transported to Kwajalein, tortured, and beheaded. The desire for vengeance for this atrocity motivated the Raiders in future battles.

Turner fought on with the Raiders, through many too-close-forcomfort situations. He was among the first landing waves at the Battles of Bougainville, Guam, and Okinawa. Though he was a long-distance runner in high school, it didn't help much on the sticky beaches of the Pacific. He endured oppressive jungle heat, chest-deep mud, and thirsty



mosquito swarms as he chopped through tropical thickets infested with Japanese snipers. One night, Turner lost contact with his colleagues while on patrol in enemy territory. He spent a long and lonely night on alert under a relentless deluge. Once, he survived a powerful earthquake while hiding in a foxhole. "The choice was between being buried or being shot," he says, although he was fortunate to suffer neither during the

Turner was among the thousands of Allied troops preparing for an invasion of mainland Japan. It was expected to be a bloodbath on both sides, and he vividly recalls his relief when the Japanese surrender was announced on August 15, 1945. Instead, he was sent to Japan as an occupying military policeman. Following that brief tour of duty, he returned to the U.S., was discharged, and began a 42-year career with General




