"You should write a book."

I think I've heard these words, though it might be my aspirational imagination's voice. There's a part of me that believes I'm capable, and a part that subconsciously dreads the potential failure as much as the laborious slog.

Few vocations have a lower barrier-to-entry than writing. If you have a language and a pen or a laptop, or – perhaps – a chatbot, you've got everything you need. But do you have a thought or a story that anyone wants or needs to hear?

A combination of unabashed ego, untainted naivete, and a love for creating something from nothing shape the nascent writer's mind. But the fear mountain demands an incredibly steep climb.

I craft this column in about an hour and a half, maybe two. From ideation (the hardest part, by far) to edited copy. But I can't sit still much longer than that. (And sometimes the two hours include a couple of away-from-the-keyboard breaks.) This page runs between 800 and 1,000 words (today it's 950), give or take a few. Per Google, "the average length of an American novel usually falls between 70,000 and 100,000 words. The character development, complex story arcs, vivid description, and soul-mining self-examination that are novel-writing musts are a lot more demanding than the work that goes into a standalone essay. So, the pace will be slower if I do it. Thus, for a 100,000word book, with a 400 words-per-hour best case, it's 250 hours for the first pass. Fifty full days, if you do 5 good hours a day...which might not sound like a lot, but it is.

After that, what do you have? Maybe it will be terrific; but, perhaps, it will mercilessly suck. And your grossly inflated self-worth will crumble beneath the weight of your disappointment and shame. The thing you have always quietly believed you were destined to do is a thing you should never have considered at all.

On the other side of the what-if coin...you're 60. Who knows how many good years you have left? Your mind seems as sharp as ever, but what about next year, or five years from now, or 10? When you "have more time." Which you will and you won't. After all, your schedule is ultimately your choice. It is now, and it will be then. And there are plenty of things you can pretend are life-dependent essential to perpetually forestall this daunting pass/fail lifetime-achievement final exam.

A book. An essay. Just words, nothing more. How does one maintain the arrogance to believe they matter, even a little bit? For me, it's down to a couple of things, and how not having or experiencing those things would lead to a less-than life.

I'm not great at opening to people in real time. If I didn't write, I'd be socially and spiritually isolated. Writing is my gateway to humanity, one that other people – most people – have without having to look for it. I often find that link to the rest of the world in the text on a page I've produced.

Writers like metaphors. Here's one. I own a rental house. I'm selling it. During due diligence, the buyer's inspection noted that the house is missing a roof vent. The house is 70 years old. It has never had a vent. So, the air in the attic hasn't circulated as well as it would have otherwise done. It's been stagnant up there for decades. Dark, damp. It's fine, but it could have been better. No leaks. No obvious problems. The roof was not going to fail. Nevertheless, the vent is important, and we installed one. Writing is a vent for me. There's a lot inside my head and it would probably be okay if it remained there, but I'm structurally better off if there's an outlet through which I can flush my festering thoughts.

For a fundamentally shy person, it's very rewarding to discover that I've connected with somebody. I was in my coffee shop with Jenna. We were meeting with somebody and doing a little work. While Jenna and the other person were exchanging words, I heard a whisper from a couple tables away. "I read his stuff all the time. I love it. He's really good." Is it bad that such a moment provides me joy...makes me feel better (about myself, perhaps, if I'm being honest) than I otherwise

Twenty-two years ago, it was excruciating to hit "send" and commit this column to print. For the next several days, I would agonize over how you or others would interpret my words. Nowadays, the process is relatively sweat-free. When my mom tells me she likes my column (which she does almost every two weeks), I often respond by asking her what it was about...and I'm not being cute. Like the air in the newly vented roof, it has benignly floated away.

I still have worries, though. The people I love – do I write about them too frequently? Or not enough to reflect how much they truly mean to me? Do I share things they have not sanctioned? (Yes.) Do they realize it's my most natural way of professing my love, even if it's a little awkward? (I hope so.) They are the characters in my story, without them my autobiography would be a massive blank page.

It comes down to this conclusion...an action item, of sorts. If one or more of you tell me I should write a book, I'm going to do it. And I'm starting right away. I might begin compiling and reworking a collection of essays, selected from a couple decades' output. But the novel will be right behind it. Got any good ideas?

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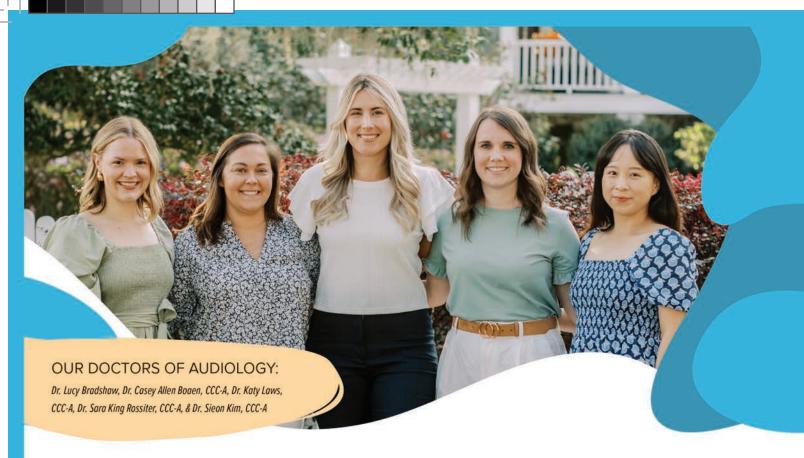

Osaka and Tokyo

ur Osaka hotel was in the Dōtonbori area, a tourist hub running along the Dotonbori Canal. Historically a theater district, the character of Dōtonbori became defined in 1621 when the ruling Shogunate instituted urban planning and designated Dotonbori as the city's entertainment district. Many restaurants and cafés were established to cater to the flood of tourists and entertainment-seekers pouring into Osaka. The area is now a popular nightlife and entertainment zone area characterized by its eccentric atmosphere and large illuminated signboards – equal parts carnival midway and Blade Runner.

One of the area's most prominent features is an illuminated billboard for the Glico Candy Company, which many regard as an Osaka icon. Dating back to 1935, the sign has had several overhauls and been altered to celebrate various sporting triumphs through the years. For example, temporary alterations occurred when Japan hosted the soccer World Cup and in support of Osaka's baseball team, the Hanshin Tigers. The current sign, recognized as the sixth generation, was installed in 2014, the first to use LED technology.

After breakfast, we headed to the Umeda Sky Building, the 15th-tallest in the prefecture. Completed in 1993, it consists of two 40-story towers interconnected at their uppermost floors via glass bridges, with escalators that cross an open atrium. The towers reach a height of 557 feet while the overall height of the building including its spires is 623 feet. The structure includes the rooftop Kuchu Teien Observatory, also known as the Floating Garden Observatory. The two-floor attraction features Café Sky 40 and the Fence of Vows. The base of the towers contains the Island Garden and the Vegetable Garden, with walking trails and water features. The building has an underground market that strives to recreate the atmosphere of Osaka in the early 20th Century.

Our second day began rainy, but after lunch the sun came out, and we headed to Osaka Castle, one of Japan's most famous landmarks. Built in the 16th Century, the castle grounds cover approximately 15 acres. The inner keep is five stories on the outside and eight stories on the inside, built atop a tall stone foundation to protect its occupants from attackers. In the 1860s, Osaka Castle became part of the Osaka Army Arsenal, manufacturing guns, ammunition, and explosives for Japan's expanding Western-style military. During World War II, the arsenal was one of the largest military armories, making it a frequent target of Allied bombing raids. On August 14, 1945, 90 percent of the arsenal was destroyed. In 1995, Osaka's government approved a two-year restoration project, intending to return the main keep to its Edo-era splendor. The keep is a modern reproduction (with elevators) of the original, and the interior is a functioning museum.

Perhaps it was the morning rain that put moisture in the air, or perhaps it was the eight-story altitude, but as we climbed higher inside

the humidity increased, along with our discomfort. Overall, Japanese weather in the areas we visited was comparable to Savannah's, though it should be noted that the main island of Japan stretches the equivalent of the area from southern Georgia to northern Maine.

TOKYO

Our journey to Tokyo, approximately 300 miles away, literally sped by in about two hours aboard one of Japan's famous bullet trains. After checking into our hotel in the heart of the Ginza district, we visited the Senso Ji Temple. With more than 30 million visitors annually, it is the most widely visited religious site in the world. The temple is dedicated to the bodhisattva Kannon. According to legend, a statue of the Kannon was found in the Sumida River in 628 AD by two fisherman. The chief of their village recognized the sanctity of the statue and enshrined it by remodeling his own house into a small temple so the villagers could worship Kannon. The first temple was founded in 645 AD, making it the oldest-established temple in Tokyo.

The Kaminarimon ("Thunder Gate") is the outer of two large entrances to the Sensō-ji (the inner being the Hōzōmon). Originally built in 941 AD, it has been destroyed many times throughout the ages, and was reconstructed in its current location in 1635, when statues of the gods of wind (Fujin) and thunder (Raijin) were first placed on the gate. Dedicated in December of 1960, the Kaminarimon's current structure stands 38 feet tall, 37 feet wide, and covers an area of 746 square feet.

Upon entering the temple grounds, the street leading to the temple – the Nakamise-Dori – is congested with small shops selling souvenirs

including fans, kimonos and other robes, Buddhist scrolls, traditional sweets, Godzilla and manga toys, t-shirts, and mobile phone accessories. These shops are part of a living tradition since the early 12th Century of selling to pilgrims who travel to Sensō-ji.

During World War II, the temple was destroyed in an air raid on Tokyo. The main hall was rebuilt in the 1950s, and is regarded as a symbol of rebirth and peace by Japanese people. In the courtyard there is a tree that was hit by a bomb in the air raids, and it had regrown in the husk of the old tree and is a similar symbol as the temple itself. Formerly associated with the Tendai sect of Buddhism, the temple became independent after the war.

For dinner that evening we visited Rare Tendon Ginza Mitsuyoshi, a tempura restaurant that was unequivocally the best meal of our trip. Reservations are required; upon entering, we understood why. The eatery consisted of a compact cooking area surrounded by a U-shaped counter with seating for nine. The tempura was excellent, the batter very light. Even the lettuce tempura was a surprising treat. I had a mix of beef, fish, and vegetables, while my wife enjoyed rare beef with vegetables. A second visit was added to our itinerary.

The following morning, we hoped to tour the Imperial Palace, the main residence of the Japanese Imperial family. It hosts ceremonies and receptions, as well as an archive, museums, and administrative offices. Unfortunately, tickets are available through a lottery system, which we should have signed up for several days in advance. Instead, we toured the palace's East Garden (for free).

The garden was built on the grounds of Edo Castle, dating to the 15th Century. In 1868, the emperor moved to Tokyo and the castle became an imperial palace until it was consumed by fire five years later. What few buildings remained were demolished in 1888 to make way for the new Imperial Palace. The building of the modern gardens – more than 50 square acres – began in 1961 and was completed in 1968.

That evening, (following our second tempura dinner) we had tickets for the TeamLab exhibit, *Borderless*. It's an immersive experience of light and sculpture, with interactive imagery (abstract and animated). Projected images move out of rooms, relate to other works, and intermingle without boundaries. One projected display featured a group of frogs marching along the wall, which was interactive. Touch the image of any frog and it turned its head toward you.

We were about to leave when we discovered another corridor we hadn't explored, discovering fresh exhibits. Sketch Ocean projected hand-drawn animated images on the walls, as if you were inside an aquarium. In an adjacent room, visitors were invited to color a fish drawing, which would then be scanned, and you would see your picture swim out into the ocean in front of you together with sea creatures drawn by other people. If you touch the fish, they will swim away. A delight for children of all ages.

Eventually, our journey to Japan came to an end, and the time had come for us to say, "Sayonara." To paraphrase an old song, I'll remember our journey until the day that I die, and I encourage others to experience the culture, the food, and the people of one of the world's oldest civilizations.

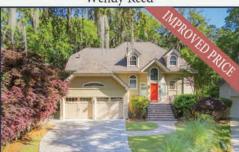

oseph Conners was born February 12, 1931, in Savannah, where of Georgia railroad station. Bound for Camp Pendleton, California, the men boarded the train to a chorus of cheers from the assembled crowd. Sadly, five of the departing Marines would not live to see Sa-

Conners settled in best he could for the cross-country journey. Un-The men of Dog Company enjoyed peacetime training until June like many of his fellow Marines, he did not drink any of the available alcoholic beverages on board, nor join in the card games. When Dog a coalition of free nations to assist South Korea against the invasion Company arrived at Camp Pendleton, each man was assigned one of three classifications: needs more basic training, or needs more advanced training, or combat ready. Since Conners had good attendance at monthly Marine Reserve meetings and had completed a summer camp session at Parris Island Marine Depot, he was classified as a qualified Marine ready for deployment to Korea.

> Assigned to the 2nd Replacement Draft, Conners boarded the USS Jackson on October 15, 1950, and stowed his gear on the third level of one of the six-level-high sleeping racks stacked close together in the crowded ship. The head (bathroom) was always occupied and there was a long line for each of the two daily meals.

The Marines arrived in Japan on October 29, 1950. After two weeks in a temporary camp, they were issued rifles (M1 Garands) and cold-weather gear. Very soon, they would need both. Conners was re-assigned to the 1st Marine Division just before its advance deep into North Korea. In bitterly cold weather, American troops pushed as far north as the Chosin Reservoir, just 40 miles shy of the Chinese border. When more than 100,000 Chinese troops swept across the border, the Marines retreated southward, suffering numerous enemy ambushes and freezing weather along the way. Reaching the coastal North Korean city of Hamhung, they were evacuated by the U.S. Navy.

After filling its ranks with much needed replacements, the 1st Marine Division assumed a defensive position along the 38th parallel dividing North and South Koreas. For three years, the Chinese sacrificed many soldiers to gain just a few yards of contested turf. The fighting was a back-and-forth stalemate.

Conners was assigned as a listening post sentry during the final six months of his deployment in Korea. Listening posts were small twoman foxholes about 100 yards in front of the MLR (main line of resistance). Conners was paired with another Savannah Dog Company Marine named Corley, who became a lifelong friend. The job was dangerous, especially at night when the Chinese often launched surprise attacks. Conners said they could hear the Chinese approaching and sometimes smell them. More than once, they saw Chinese to their rear flank, meaning they were surrounded. Yet somehow, with a little luck and adequate support, Conners and Corley made it through without being wounded. Undoubtedly Conners' naturally calm nature was a valuable asset under the circumstances.

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When his tour in Korea ended Conners enjoyed a troop ship cruise home, where he was honorably discharged and returned to his hometown. In 1956, he met and married the love of his life, Martha Ward. The happy marriage produced three children, four grandchildren, and four great-grandchildren. He was a devoted Catholic and lived his life accordingly.



Conners enjoyed a happy and full life in Savannah, where for 18 years he was a warehouse manager for John Travis Company. His sense of humor won the hearts of many good friends, and he enjoyed traveling, playing golf, and carpentry.

Though Conners seldom spoke of his experience in Korea, he became a lifetime member of Dog Company and very active in local military and veterans' affairs. In 2000, he served as chairman of the Savannah Veterans Council and was honored as Veteran of the Year

On July 10, 2025, Joseph Lamont Conners passed away peacefully, surrounded by his family. Like the saying goes, another Marine just reported to St. Peter for guard duty at the Pearly Gates. Or, in Joe Conners' case, heaven's listening post.

Check yourself as of proactive prevention. "Especially if have diabetes, you should look at your feet every day and make sure there are no sores," Moore says.

> "We are an advanced wound care provider," Moore explains. "We have learned that when you start getting ulcers or wounds that are not healing, there may be some other issue going on. We get patients here and evaluate the totality of their condition."

> The wound care team consists of nurses and doctors who are specially trained in wound care and hyperbarics. They examine underlying issues, such as blood flow, compression, inappropriate shoes, and sleep patterns to determine why a wound might not heal properly. They have numerous ways to treat a wound and address the underlying causes if it's not healing. This helps prevent future wounds in addition to expediting healing for existing problems.

andals, flip-flops, thongs, slides, "slippahs" ... They have different names but were designed for a similar purpose – protecting your feet from hot sand or pavement on the short trip from your chair to the water. In fact, most podiatrists recommend these types of shoes for a public pool or beach, where walking barefoot can make your soles susceptible to plantar warts, athlete's foot, glass, and other hazards.

Problems arise, however, when you leave flip-flops on as you spend the afternoon shopping or going about your daily routine. Our Southern coastal weather inspires residents to wear such footwear throughout the year, more so than people in – say – Michigan would.

Prianka Sharma, DPM, who treats patients at St. Joseph's/Candler's Physician Network -Podiatry, understands that area residents are going to wear flip-flops. She notes the lack of support in most flip-flop-style footwear and cautions that too much time in them will be taxing on your feet.

"You're not helping yourself by wearing flipflops," Sharma says. "There is no arch support, no shock absorption, and no heel cup, so you're not stabilizing the heel in any way. If you know you are going to be walking for more than 10 minutes, put on a pair of tennis shoes."

The local podiatrist wants patients to understand that it's not just about this summer, but all the summers to come. "Everyone's feet are different, and we all have varying levels of arthritis and foot issues, but our goals are the same," Sharma says. "You want to keep what you have; you want to keep your tendons preserved. And if something is already bad, you need support to keep it from getting worse."

You might believe that if all the bones and muscles in your feet are in working order and you can get from point A to point B, that's the end of the story. But proper support and shock absorption prevent podiatric problems down the road. Poorly supported feet can tire stressed feet can lead to stressed knees and hips.



Take Healthy Steps

- Look for high-quality, soft leather sandals. Soft leather helps lower the chance of irritated or blistered skin.
- Before buying, very gently bend flip-flops to ensure they flex at the ball of the foot. They shouldn't fold in half.
- Don't wear flip-flops for yard work. This leaves your feet exposed to potential injury.
- The toe thong in many flip-flops can lead to blisters. Don't ignore irritation developing between your toes.
- Don't play sports in flip-flops. You could twist your ankle.

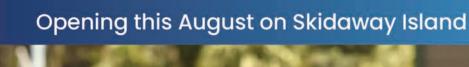
Poor foot support is no day at the beach. With painful feet, you risk losing enjoyment associated with healthy activities like walking, playing a sport, or travel. If you become increasingly sedentary, your risk for diseases like obesity, high blood pressure, and diabetes increases.

"There are some brands such as Orthofeet and Vionic that engineer arch support within their sandals and other products," Sharma notes. "So not all flip-flops are created equal. However, in general, there's no support, and as podiatrists we typically don't like them.'

Sharma is also a realist about women's shoe options. In terms of foot function and health, many women's shoes simply aren't very good, but sandals and flip-flops are among the worst. Sharma educates patients on support and shock absorption, but she won't dictate what you can and

"As long as you wear flip-flops for a short period of time, you can avoid damaging your feet," she says. "And I understand that sometimes we just want to look good."

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uys like toys. Cars, boats, tractors some of the most extravagant examples of this kind of obsession. When we get one, we manically use it with unsustainable frequency. To a guy, a great grill is pure joy.

You remember the child at Christmas who played with his new gadget for hours before changing out of his pajamas and never touched the thing again after his mom put it in the toy chest when the morning turned to afternoon? You probably were that kid, at least once. When considering purchasing "toys" as a grown-up, we must convince ourselves that our attention spans have lengthened vis-à-vis our little-kid selves. So far granted, we're only about one month into it - such has been the case with my new grill.

It took hours of assembly and some lastmile help from a professional, which intensified the anticipation around its first use. About midway through cooking a steak that night, I pressed a button, not sure what it was. Suddenly, cobalt-blue LED lights blazed circles from behind six burner knobs. The next day, I rigged the rotisserie, which was included with the Monument 77352. The piercing implement is as long and dangerous as a medieval lance. 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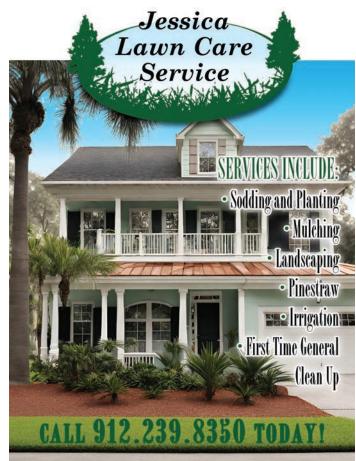
raw on the other. I consulted printed directions written by somebody (or AI) for whom English is a second (at best) language. I checked the Internet. Finally, I stared at the contraption until I noticed a nut for a fitting that would prevent future rod-slippage and rotisserie ills. I was effusively proud of my handiwork.

You can grill anything, pretty much. It's fun to cook things using different techniques and heat intensities on one machine at the same time. And the kitchen remains relatively mess-free. In a few weeks, I've prepared whole fish and chickens, various lamb parts, at least four steak cuts, a farmer's-market-range of vegetables, and a pair of lobsters

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Lid down. Lid up. Direct and indirect heat. All six burners raging. Or just one or two. On the spit and on the grates. In a basket, so the little bits don't fall into the flaming abyss. It's all good.

One night I made purple cauliflower, green peppers, little yellow tomatoes, a Vidalia onion, radicchio, eggplant, zucchini, and half of a fresh Sockeye salmon. These things are so nice on their own, they don't require accompaniment, but an all-purpose condiment doesn't hurt. This is my favorite. It works on almost anything. Play with the ratios, depending on your preferred flavor profile. I avoid the food processor for this one; I chop each element finely by hand, but you can use the mechanical help if you like.

SALSA VERDE

1 bunch flat-leaf Italian parsley

4 cloves garlic

Zest and juice of a lemon

1 jar best-quality anchovies

1 generous pinch of red pepper flakes

Best-quality extra virgin olive oil

Chop garlic, parsley, and anchovies together and scoop the resultant mixture into a bowl. Add lemon zest, juice, red pepper flakes, and salt, and mix well. Slowly add olive oil to reach your desired consistency (I prefer a thick, "dry"-ish salsa), and continue to stir well to incorporate everything. Let sit for at least 30 minutes to marry the elements. Spoon on top of grilled anything.





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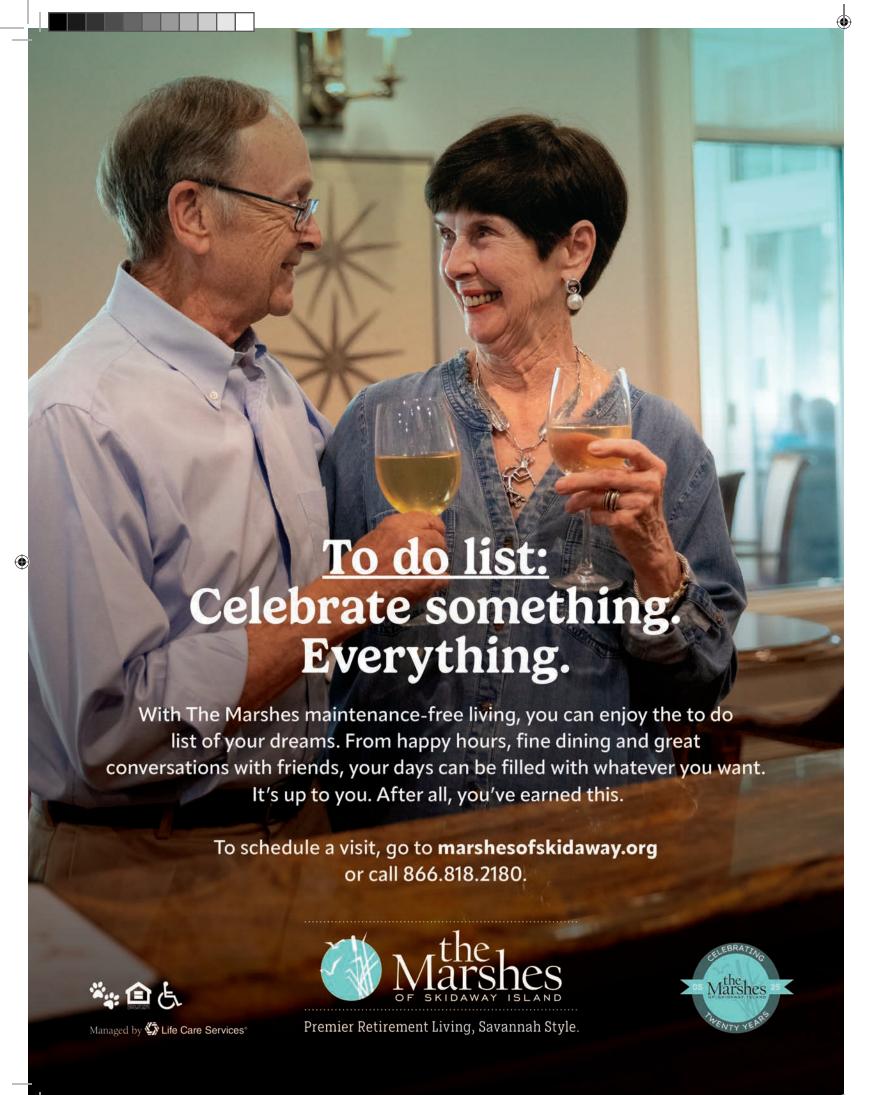
