

Less than two weeks ago, the SavPhil announced its tion's evolution. 2022/23 season. With certainty, it is the organization's most ambitious annum in its 14-year history. From September through May, SavPhil musicians will perform 25 times in 18 distinct locations, including neighborhoods that will host their first-ever orchestral events. At the core of the SavPhil schedule: A seven-show subscription series at the historic Lucas Theatre, with a holiday "Messiah" concert at the majestic Cathedral Basilica of St. John the Baptist. From Brahms to modern cinema (movie included), dinosaurs (look it up) to Debussy, to a pair of Rachmaninoff concertos in a single night by one of the world's greatest pianists (Stephen Hough), and

The ethos of today's SavPhil is "Something for Everyone," and pricing reflects it. The subscription series spans five tiers of seating options, ranging from \$140 to \$420 (for the entire package), or between \$20 and \$60 per performance (when you break down the math). To sustain a vibrant environment for the arts, the SavPhil is actively cultivating the next generation of artists and patrons. The orchestra provides ongoing, high-impact educational programs to approximately 600 young people, and fields and trains an all-star junior ensemble. The SavPhil sources and distributes hundreds of instruments to aspiring players for whom their purchase would be an unrealistic luxury. Further evidence of the orchestra's commitment to audience development: The SavPhil offers subscription-series tickets to children/students for \$56, covering the entire season (the equivalent of \$8 per of personal and communal joy. Secure your share. seat for each Lucas Theatre show).

The SavPhil is a mission-driven community asset serving as a beacon of pride, joy and inspiration for us all. Leadership's pursuit of artistic excellence has never been more fervent. The team relentlessly strives to connect with as many of the 350,000 folks in our region as possible, a strategy that is a hallmark of the organiza-



Chatham County Police Officer Daniel "Alex" Hodgson, for whom Hodgson Memorial Drive is named.

details. Consider Hodgson Memorial Drive – a busy, commercial street that runs from Stephenson Avenue to the north, past banks and fast-food restaurants and Oglethorpe Mall, past a former post of the Chatham County Police Department starting in 1973, culminating at Montgomery Cross Road at its southern extremity. I assumed for years that Hodgson Memorial had been named for William Brown Hodgson, the New England-born diplomat and husband of Margaret Telfair, and a major contributor to civic

and intellectual life in 1800s Savannah. But the real person behind Hodgson Memorial Drive was an everyday hero more akin to Sgt. Jasper than the high-brow Hodgson.

Daniel Alexander Hodgson – he went by "Alex" – relocated to Savannah from Athens with his family when he was only three. The Hodgsons made their home in the Kensington Park neighborhood. An excellent diver, Alex joined the Kensington Park swim team, earning numerous competitive medals.

Among his many siblings (three brothers and two stepsisters), Hodgson had a special fondness for his younger sister, Kitty. She likewise held deep admiration for him, recalling his willingness to teach her to drive. Eventually, Kitty would would name her first child in honor of Alex.

Hodgson graduated from Herschel V. Jenkins High School in 1970. He enrolled in what was then Georgia Southern College, where he earned a degree in psychology, and met his future bride, Karen Jones. The couple had one child, a daughter named Mandi. As newly minted college graduates will, Hodgson meandered among a few different professional positions. He served as a liaison consultant with a textile manufacturer in South Carolina, then an adjunct therapist at Savannah's Broad Oaks Hospital, a mental health facility, before becoming a police officer. A friend of the Hodgson family, Frank Downing, was Chatham County Commissioner at the time, and was pleased to help Hodgson secure a position with Chatham County Police Department. Once trained, badged and sworn in, the 23-year-old officer was eager to show his sister Kitty his brandnew police uniform.

Tragically, the young patrolman perished in the line of duty only four months later. In March of 1976, as the city and nation geared up for the American Bicentennial, he and four other officers responded to reports of a man who had been firing a gun in the Liberty City neighborhood of West Savannah. According to ODMP.com, the gunman was hiding in a closet inside his home. As the officers searched for him, he pointed a shotgun out of the closet and fired two shots. The first shot wounded two of the officers. The second shot struck Hodgson in the chest, killing him.

The suspect was taken into custody eight hours later. He was sentenced to life in prison www.theskinnie.com

for the murder of Hodgson, and to 30 years for the aggravated assault of the other officers.


Although the tragedy preempted any future hopes for Hodgson, his family knew that he aspired to earn an additional degree – in accounting – at Armstrong State College, to help fulfill his goal as a special agent with the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The golden age of 19th-century monument-building had passed, leaving Hodgson's family and the whole of Savannah and Chatham County with only a street name in his honor. Yet just like Jasper, Daniel Alexander Hodgson was a young man of great ability, imbued with an even greater willingness to place the welfare of others ahead of his own.

As Peace Officers Memorial Day approaches (May 15), perhaps the best honor in memory of the fallen is the "memorial" of ongoing service and commitment to duty.

"The men and women of the Chatham County Police Department who laid down their lives while protecting our community are never forgotten," says Chatham County police chief Jeff Hadley. "We honor them each day when we pin on our badge, report for duty, and serve the people of Chatham County. We are proud and privileged to carry on their legacy."

Roger Smith is a native of Savannah who served as director of education at the Georgia Historical Society. Today, he directs The Learning Center, Savannah's lifelong learning program at Senior Citizens, Inc.

fter a two-year hiatus, Savannah's grand celebration of Scottish heritage returns to the campus of the historic Bethesda Academy on May 7. The 44th Savannah Scottish Games welcomes athletes, pipe bands, Highland dancers, Celtic musicians, historic re-enactors, Scottish vendors, border collies and much more. The event is the fourth-oldest Scottish games – as well as one of largest – in the Southeast, with more than 3,000 people participating each year.

Stewart Marshall has been involved with the games since he was a child, and recalls sharing many great memories with his family and fellow Scottish clans over the years. "The music, camaraderie and commemoration of our Scottish heritage is celebrated through this historic event," he says. "This year's celebration is going to be extra special, as we host our first in-person event since 2019."

Historically, Scottish games are a worldwide celebration of the legendary strength and endurance of the Highlander. Scottish heavy athletics owe their roots to the Celtic warriors who would keep in shape between battles by competing among themselves using everyday

implements. A stone, a blacksmith's hammer, and a tree trunk (known as a caber) all became tools for building and maintaining strength for battle.

Spectators enjoy athletes competing in events such as the caber toss, sheaf toss, open stone put, Scottish hammer throw, and more. If you fancy yourself a Highlander, spectators are invited to take their turns. Novices who would like to learn "to throw" are encouraged to be on the field at 7:30 a.m. on Games Day for a one-hour clinic (kilts are not required).

Athletic events are hosted throughout the day and include activities for the entire family to enjoy. Children are invited to grab a seat and hear the greatest of Scotland's stories from Celtic storyteller Linda Bandilier, and dance and play games with the mythical fairy, Zephyr. Face-painting, coloring, crafts and other arts activities will be available. There are many athletic activities for children, including the tugof-war, sheaf toss, caber toss, haggis hurl, stone throw, welly toss and sack race.



ous sounds of the pipes and drums are an inspiration to behold. Some historians believed that bagpipes were played in Scotland as early as 100 AD. By the year 1,000, the bagpipes were popular throughout Scotland. By 1,500, every clan chieftain worthy of the name had a piper in his retinue. The modern great pipes were developed in the Scottish Highlands. The Savannah Scottish Games honors this tradition with a piping competition and bagpipe bands.


This year, Stewart Marshall was tasked with organizing the pipe and drums. "I encourage everyone to come and listen to the sounds of Scotland," he says. "The thrill in the bourdon of the bagpipes and the cadence of the drums from the talented pipers and drummers is something that sticks with you. It is one of my favorite parts of the event."

Live Celtic music from Seldom Sober and Clann Ciúil will be featured on the entertainment stage. The full performance schedule can be found at savannahscottishgames. com. In addition, the marketplace of the Savannah Scottish Games is centralized within the festival and provides the opportunity to purchase Scottish goods, cuisine and refresh-

ments, and baked goods.

The Society for Creative Anachronism (SCA) is a practical history society that recreates the arts and skills of Medieval Europe. Dressed in clothing of the Middle Ages and Renaissance, the Savannah branch of the SCA will host interactive demonstrations and activities, such as armored combat simulations. Visitors are invited to experience tournaments, royal courts, feasts, juggling and dancing, providing them with an opportunity to learn and practice ancient arts and skills — calligraphy, cooking, armoring, metalworking, carpentry and needlework.

"The Savannah Scottish Games celebrates the best of Celtic heritage," says Bob Williams, chair of this year's event. "Scottish Clans from throughout the country staff clan tents (booths) during the event, which provide attendees the opportunity to learn more about the different Highland clans, their own heritage, and to possibly find their own roots."

According to Williams, the key to gathering clues regarding your Scottish ancestors is knowing where to look for available records about your name, immigrant ancestor, Scottish history and geography, and where to find more information. "We have plenty of maps and reading materials about researching Scottish, Irish, Welsh and English ancestors," he says.

Staying Fit Over 40

Exercise Preserves Muscle Mass and Strength

☐ irst, the not-so-good news: Around age → 30, you begin to lose muscle mass. In fact, adults lose 3 to 8 percent of their lean muscle mass per decade. By the time you turn 60, your muscle strength will deteriorate at a rate of three percent per year.

"As you age, your body naturally loses muscle mass," explains Brittany Hartl, wellness coordinator for the St. Joseph's/Candler Wellness Center. "It is important to slow that progression by continuing to challenge your muscles through strength training and cardiovascular exercise."

The good news: Regular exercise helps you retain muscle mass and strength, and can deter degenerative diseases, such as osteoporosis, and chronic conditions like diabetes and heart disease.

"Not only is it important to maintain an overall healthy physique, but it is equally important to maintain your independence as you age and continue your activities of daily living," Hartl says. "Exercise can provide more than just physical benefits, but also social and mental support, especially if you work out in a group setting."

It's never too late to improve your strength and maintain muscle mass. Here are four strength-training exercises focus on muscle mass development, especially if you do them at least twice a week.

Squats help keep your hips, thighs and gluteal muscles strong so that you can continue to walk, run and climb stairs easily. Standing in front of a chair with your feet slightly more than shoulder-width apart, extend your arms in front of you. Slowly bend your knees and sit down in the chair while counting to four, keeping your weight in your heels. Then stand up to the count of two while keeping your knees over your ankles and your back straight. Repeat

10 times, rest for a minute and then do a second set of 10.

Wall push-ups aren't as hard to do as push-ups on the floor, but they can strengthen your arms, shoulders and chest. While facing a wall, stand a little more than an arm's length away from it and lean your body forward to place your palms at (roughly) shoulder-height and shoulder-width apart. Keep your feet planted and do a push-up by bending your elbows and slowly "lowering" your body toward the wall as you count to four. Then push yourself off the wall by slowly straightening your arms, counting to four once more. Don't lock your elbows. Repeat 10 times, rest for a minute and then do a second set

Calf raises strengthen your calves and ankles, which facilitates walking and enhances your sense of balance and stability. While holding on to a chair or a counter for balance, slowly rise up on your toes as far as you can while counting to four and hold for two to four seconds. Then lower your heels to the floor while counting to four. Repeat 10 times, then rest for a minute before doing a second set of 10.

Bicep curls bolster this major arm muscle, which comes in handy when you are lifting groceries or the grandkids. Stand or sit with dumbbells in each hand, with your arms at your sides, palms

> facing your thighs. As you count to two, rotate your forearms and slowly bend your elbows while lifting the weights your palms facing in toward your shoulders. Keep your elbows close to your side. Pause, and then slowly lower your dumbbells back down to your thighs as you count to four, ending with your arms again at your side. Repeat 10 times, rest for a minute, then do another set of 10. When your weights become easier to lift, switch to heavier dumbbells.

Dynamic Warm-Up Tips for Tennis and Pickleball

ow that the warmer weather is upon us and the time change provides extra hours of daylight, you're likely to take to the courts. A proper warmup can prepare you for both competitive matches and friendly games. Dynamic warmup and flexibility training are essential to pre-practice or pre-competition session. They prepare the body for the demands of tennis or pickleball.

An effective warmup does five important

- 1. Increases body temperature, which allows muscles to work efficiently.
- 2. Gets the heart and lungs ready for vigorous activity.
- 3. Stretches muscles actively, preparing them for the coming exertion.

- 4. Encourages proper movement patterns Leg swings at the net (forward/back/side, and necessary coordination.
- 5. Wakes the nervous system and gets the brain talking with the muscles.

All dynamic exercise should be performed in a controlled manner, focusing on deep breathing. To get started, here is a list of dynamic warmup exercises:

- Light jog around the court with progressive arm circles
- Jog up to the net and backpedal to the baseline
- Side shuffle length of baseline (x2)
- Jumping jacks (x10)
- Lunge walk with shoulder rotation from the

Growing up in West "By God" Virginia, Wotring graduated high school in 1961. He had completed two years of technical school in 1964 when he decided to enlist in the Marine Corps, continuing a family tradition of military service. During World War II, his maternal grandfather served in the Marines, and his father and eldest brother in the Navy. Another brother served in the Marines in the Bay of Pigs fiasco in Cuba in 1961.

Wotring reported to Parris Island, South Carolina, on August 31, 1965. Upon completion of boot camp, he moved to Camp Geiger, North Carolina, for advanced infantry training. He volunteered for duty in Vietnam, and shipped off to Camp Pendleton, California, where his orders were changed and his transfer to Southeast Asia delayed. In California, Wotring trained to be a military policeman before shipping out to Vietnam.

During his first four months in-country, Wotring did security duty outside a large POW detention camp. He was then assigned to the Combined Action Program (CAP), 3rd Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment, operating near the Da Nang area of coastal South Vietnam. CAP forces lived among the South Vietnamese people, working closely with local units to defend remote towns and villages. The village "friendlies" were fearful of cooperating as informers, so troops had a hard time differentiating friend from foe. To make matters worse, they were often ambushed while on patrol.

On April 25, 1967, near a village in Quang Tin Province, Wotring, then a corporal, was hit hard as an enemy mortar round exploded near him. It knocked him down and almost unconscious, he recalls. His left foot was blown off and most of his teeth were knocked out. Bleeding and in pain, he was unaware that he had also been hit by shrapnel in his neck and right elbow. A nearby corpsman rushed to Wotring's assistance, immediately administering first aid. The corpsman saved

An evacuation helicopter arrived on scene but was unable to land because of intense enemy fire. "It seemed like forever," Wotring says of the moments he waited for the chopper to touch down. "I can still remember the increasing pain as I lay there waiting for the helo to land."

In addition to his visible wounds, the explosion blinded Wotring, and it took 12 years for him to regain his vision.

Wotring was rushed to the military hospital at Da Nang, followed by a long plane ride to Walter Reed Hospital in Bethesda, Maryland. After multiple surgeries, he was transferred to the Naval Hospital in Portsmouth, Virginia, where he developed gangrene in his left leg. He was at Portsmouth for several months, heavily sedated as he recovered. Wotring was then transferred to the naval hospital in Philadelphia, where he was fitted with a prosthetic left foot and ankle. He was determined to live as "normally" as possible. "At first I suffered a lot of discomfort, but with the assistance of the medical staff there, I eventually learned to walk unassisted," he says.





When he was released from medical care, Wotring came to Savannah and enrolled at Savannah Tech, where earned an associate's degree in pipefitting. That led to a job at Elba Island on the Savannah River where he helped build storage tanks for the liquefied natural gas facility there. A few years later, after the initial construction was completed, Wotring became a union plumber until a series of heart attacks led to four heart surgeries and permanent retirement in 1978.

Wotring remembers the time after his return home from combat as emotionally challenging. Despite his wounds, he was verbally disparaged for his service on several occasions. He says that one set of ugly insults came courtesy of a federal employee. But Ronald Reagan's letter of gratitude in 1984 help to erase any lingering malaise.

The former leatherneck and his wife Brenda can be found most afternoons socializing at George K. Gannam American Legion Post 184, where he has been a member for the past 40 years. He is also a lifetime member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Purple Heart Association (inactive).

Wotring is proud of his Vietnam Campaign Medal with Device, but he is even more proud of another emblem he carries with him – the eagle, globe and anchor insignia of the Marine Corps, painted on his prosthetic ankle. "It helps me to get around," he jokes. As the saying goes, "Once a Marine, always a Marine."





THE EAGLE HAS LANDED

Tf you've ever enjoyed watching bald eagles on a bird-cam, in the treetops at the Bartram Road lagoon, or above the Moon River Bridge, thank the Endangered Species Act. May 20, the third Friday in May, is Endangered Species Day, an opportunity to celebrate success stories like the bald eagle, and to raise awareness about restoration efforts for imperiled species.

In the 1960s, as few as 500 bald eagles remained in the continental U.S. Pesticides had contaminated their habitats and resulted in the death of young eagles, often before hatching. Thanks to the protections afforded by the Endangered Species Act (ESA) passed in 1973, bald eagle numbers have rebounded to more than 71,000 breeding pairs today.

"The underlying purpose of the ESA is to preserve biodiversity," says Skidaway Audubon President Dawn Cordo. "Losing even a single species can negatively impact an entire ecosystem, because the effects can be felt throughout the food chain."

Under the ESA, the federal government has the responsibility to protect species that are likely to become extinct, as well as threatened species that are likely to become endangered. The ESA protects critical habitats - areas vital to the survival of endangered or threatened

Georgia is home to 69 species of plants and animals protected under the ESA, including the leatherback sea turtle, Kemp's ridley sea



turtle, the hawksbill sea turtle, the red-cockaded woodpecker, the flatwoods salamander, piping plovers, red knots, and wood storks. The diamondback terrapin is a protected species under Georgia law.

How can you help? The Georgia Department of Natural Resources has established several specialty license plates, each funding a different conservation program, including the Wildlife/Bald Eagle plate. Revenue from this license plate go to Georgia's Wildlife Conservation Fund. In addition to supporting conservation, education and monitoring and restoration efforts, these funds help acquire thousands of acres of wildlands. To obtain a special plate, visit the Chatham County Tag Office.

In addition to bald eagles, Skidaway Island is home to federally protected wood storks. Standing taller than three feet, with a five-foot wingspan, they are often seen wading in shallow waters, their long bills ajar searching for fish. In the U.S., this rare bird breeds only in

coastal Georgia, Florida and South Carolina. Stork populations have dropped due mainly to loss of habitat.

Among the objectives of Skidaway Audubon is to encourage residents to help protect water quality for the many water birds that feed in local lagoons and need clean water to survive.

"We're an all-volunteer organization, and deeply appreciate our dedicated volunteers and our very generous donors. Together, they make our programs and environmental initiatives possible," Cordo explains. "Please check out our website and click on 'About Us' to learn how to make a difference and help protect our threatened and endangered species.'
