# Upfront

My friend explained a scientific experiment that suggests the experiences of our ancestors can be imprinted on our genes. I Googled it. A 2013 study found an intergenerational effect of trauma associated with scent. Researchers blew acetophenone - the scent of cherry blossom – through the cages of adult male mice, while zapping their feet with jarring electric current at the same time. Eventually, the mice associated the smell of cherry blossom with pain. These males bred with female mice. When their pups smelled the scent of cherry blossom, the juveniles became jumpy and nervous compared to pups whose fathers hadn't been similarly shocked. To account for nature-versus-nurture, the little ones were raised by unrelated mice with no cherry blossom experiences. The grand-pups of the trauma-laden males showed heightened sensitivity to the scent, too. Neither of the generations responded unusually to smells other than cherry blossom, indicating that the inherited predisposition was scent-specific. In other words, it's likely that there are elements of ourselves that are, simply, "in us," for better and for worse.

My above-mentioned friend has Roman roots. Her father was born in the Eternal City. I trace my family history along adjacent lines. My grandfather lived his early years in a hilltop village about 60 miles southeast of the Colosseum before boarding a boat for New York. I've visited Rome many times since my first trip in 1989. I see things that are both ancient and completely new to me during each sojourn. But it's the inexplicable familiarity that lures me back. A sense that I am, in some way, of the place. That it is "in me," as it was in those who begat the ones who begat the ones who begat the ones who begat me.

When I finish this essay, we're heading for the airport. We're flying to Rome. It's my favorite moment to visit there, smack in the middle of artichoke season with the tourist count at its annual low. This year is different, though. It's much more than a pilgrimage searching for and honoring my past. It's a celebration of the present and the future, too, blessing our wedding by feasting to it with plenty of pasta and 20-plus friends. It's something I couldn't have imagined a couple of years ago. Now, it's something that I couldn't imagine living without.

If I were a philosopher, I might have coined a phrase to the following effect: The tear of each sadness waters the soil for a hundred happinesses to come. (Forgive me...I just made it up on the fly.) Indeed, this trip is a happy, happy thing.

The pictures on this page, taken over the years, represent Rome to me. Weighty history, spiritual grace, and earthly joy. The place is "in me." By the time you read this, I will once again gratefully be in it.

Dementia is not a disease - it is an umbrella term for the

tive abilities that are severe enough to interfere with daily life. Although

more than five million adults 65 and older are living with dementia, it's

important to note that it is not a part of normal aging. Many older adults


live their entire lives without dementia.

Although research is ongoing, dementia is caused by damage to and/ or loss of nerve cells and their connection to areas of the brain. Depending on which areas are affected, symptoms can vary. Symptoms depend on the type and stage of an individual's particular dementia. Before

we delve into the various types of dementia and signs, please understand that only a healthcare provider can and should provide a diagnosis. If you believe you or a loved one may be suffering from a form of dementia, please schedule an appointment with your healthcare provider.

Dementia is caused by various diseases and is nothing to be embarrassed by or hidden away. The more common forms of dementia

• Alzheimer's Disease - The most common form of dementia accounts for 60 to 80 percent of all cases. It's a progressive disease that



uons

gradually erodes memory, cognitive functions, and the ability to perform daily tasks. As we age, the risk of Alzheimer's increases, making it important to understand early signs. One of the most common is difficulty remembering newly learned tasks. As the brain disease progresses, symptoms include changes in mood and personality, decreased or poor judgment, and difficulty completing familiar tasks.

• Vascular Dementia - This is the second most common cause of dementia, often a result of stroke-related brain damage. Cognitive skills decline because of blocked or reduced blood flow to the various regions of the brain, causing confusion, impaired judgment, poor balance, and difficulty concentrating.

• Lewy Body Dementia - LBD combines elements of Alzheimer's and Parkinson's Diseases, resulting in hallucinations, spontaneous changes in attention and alertness, and motor challenges. As with other types of dementia, there is no single test that can identify Lewy Body Dementia. It is best left to professionals to make the proper clinical diagnosis.

#### **RECOGNIZING THE SIGNS**

Because dementia is a general term, symptoms vary widely from person to person. 

• Being set in your ways and becoming irritable when a routine is disrupted is typical. Personality changes, unexplained shifts in mood, becoming fearful, confused, suspicious, depressed, or anxious can be early signs of dementia.

Recognizing any of these signs in yourself or a loved one is scary, but it is important to act when you do. The more information you have, the better equipped you will be to navigate the road ahead.

#### CAREGIVING

Caring for a loved one with dementia requires a special and developed set of skills. Two cornerstones are patience and giving grace to yourself and your loved one. As cognitive abilities decline, individuals with dementia may experience confusion, frustration, and anxiety, leading to challenging behaviors. It is often hard to remember that the culprit is the progression of a disease. Showing compassion, kindness, and love to someone, even if they might not seem to appreciate it, is difficult. These tips may help:

• Knowledge is power and the foundation of effective caregiving. Understanding the specific type of dementia your loved one is facing allows for tailored care strategies. Speak with your healthcare provider. The more you know, the more prepared you will be to meet their changing needs.

• Create a supportive environment that fosters a calm and familiar atmosphere. Minimize distractions, establish routines, and create a safe space that reduces anxiety for your loved one. Redirection techniques are useful. For example, if your loved one becomes agitated while trying to complete a task, gently redirecting their attention to a familiar and enjoyable activity can help diffuse tension.



Maintaining eye contact and actively listening are critical to effective communication.

• Clear, effective communication and patience and are vital. Use simple language, maintain eye contact, and listen actively. Non-verbal cues and touch can often convey more than words. Acknowledge your loved one's emotions and validate their feelings to establish a sense of understanding and connection.

• Promote independence by encouraging your loved one to perform tasks they can handle. This will help maintain a degree of independence and contribute to a sense of purpose and dignity. Familiar tasks, making simple decisions, and achieving small goals give some control over their daily activities and can help those living with dementia feel more alert, stimulated, and engaged.

any people around their mid-30s look in the mirror and see someone "older," while they don't feel the effects of age. The mirror is objective. If reflects our true age if we we have not taken measures to maintain a youthful appearance.

A younger face is full and oval with no shadows under the eyes. It doesn't portray naturally occurring tell-tale signs of aging like the tear trough, Marionettes lines, and hollow cheeks.

What happens to make us look older? First, our skin starts losing its youthful appearance. Age spots and fine lines begin to appear, the glow fades, and the shape of the lower face begins to change. Lips that were once full start to thin, and the distance between the nose and the upper lip lengthens due to sagging. The corners of the lips may start to turn down, giving one a sad appearance even when one is perfectly content.

Good news: These aging signs can be minimized or even reversed. Surgical eyelid lifts, brow lifts, and facelifts yield the most durable results. But for many, non-surgical procedures are more attractive, given relatively short downtimes and affordability. These simpler solutions work well if done by the right hands and in the right combinations.

## Your Risk for RSV Prevention and Treatment at Any Age

Then you hear about respirato- ease ry syncytial virus (RSV), you might think about an illness tems that attacks babies and young children. Rightfully so - RSV is a very serious concern for parents and pediatricians. However, adults - particularly the aged and immunocompromised - can get infected, too.

RSV is a virus that attacks the respira-

tory system, explains Dr. Francisco Fan-

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that between 60,000 to 160,000 older adults in the U.S. are hospitalized with RSV each year. Between 6,000 to 10,000 die due to RSV infection.

"It's very, very serious in babies, but we also know it can attack adults," Fantauzzi says. "Usually, young people with a complete, healthy immune system get a cold and it goes away. But older people, people with diabetes, heart disease, lung disease, or any condition that weakens the immune system, they will likely suffer more."

If you are at high risk for RSV, or interact with older adults, you should take precaution to prevent infection. People at highest risk for severe infection include:

• Older adults (60 years old and older) • Adults with chronic heart or lung dis-

#### **DIAGNOSIS AND TREATMENT**

RSV often begins as a cold. If you are at elevated risk, the cold can progress to RSV. You may develop more severe symptoms than the common cold, such as difficulty breathing, shortness of breath, wheezing, coughing, or lower oxygen levels.

"If you are having a hard time breathing, you can't catch your breath, or have a high fever, it's time to call your doctor or go to urgent care or the emergency room," Fantauzzi advises.

A nasal swab test can diagnose RSV, which presents in similar fashion as other respiratory illnesses like the flu and COVID. Depending on the severity of your symptoms, your doctor can prescribe a treatment, which might include steroid medications.

#### PREVENTION

RSV season in most parts of the U.S. starts in the fall and peaks in winter. Preventing contamination requires a multipronged approach that includes good

hygiene (washing your hands, cleaning frequently touched surfaces, etc.) and following a healthy lifestyle. Fantauzzi recommends vaccination to his patients 60 and older. There are currently two RSV vaccines for adults. Both are single-dose and boost your immune system to fight against infection.

"Get your immunizations and stay up to date with them; follow a good diet; exercise regularly; and avoid alcohol and smoking," Fantuzzi says. "Not doing those things will beat down your immune system and make vou vulnerable to infection and sickness."



# JOE LOUIS

## HE SERVED BY RON LAURETTI



oe Louis Barrow (the seldom-used surname was Louis's father's, whom the champ barely knew as the elder was committed to a state hospital when the younger was 2) was born May 13, 1914, m rural Lafayette, Alabama, the seventh of eight children. Both his parents were children of former slaves and they worked as sharecroppers in the post-Civil War South.

Louis did not do well academically in the local segregated school; but, at age 11, while sparring with a friend, he discovered he had a natural affinity for boxing. Muscular and lithe, he combined power with speed, even as a youngster.

To escape the poverty and increasing racism, the family moved to the Detroit area in 1926, where factory work was available. The pay was low, but employment was steady and reliable. Louis worked and boxed, quite well in his amateur pugilistic career. In 1934, after winning 50 of 54 fights without much coaching or management and a Golden Gloves championship, Louis turned professional, winning his first fight with a first-round technical knockout. A hall-of-fame run had begun.

Even the coming war couldn't stop the slugger's ascent to boxing legend. But there was one person from which Louis hoped to hide the stories of his squared-circle exploits. He dropped Barrow from his name so that his mother would not realize it was her son as word spread of the rising star. Louis's mother had hoped her son would pursue the more civilized path of a musician.

Louis's victories included wins over Italian giant Primo Carnera and American Max Baer, both former champi-

ons. Known as the "Brown Bomber," Louis quickly became a hero to Black Americans, and beloved by his countrymen for his class and grace. In 1937, Louis became the World Heavyweight Boxing champion by defeating James Braddock.

In June of 1938, Louis defended his title against a German champion, Max Schmeling. Two years prior, Schmeling had defeated Louis, and the Brown Bomber was eager for a rematch. Though proud to be German, Schmeling resented being used for Nazi propaganda and denied Hitler's claims of Aryan superiority. Still, the fight was billed as "freedom versus fascism." Several days before the bout, Louis visited the White House, where President Franklin D. Roosevelt told the young boxer he "had to win." Schmeling went down in the first round, silencing - for the moment - the racial ranting of the Third Reich.

Already an American hero, Louis answered the call to service, enlisting in the army in January of 1942 and promoting American pride. After boot camp, the Army sent Louis to cavalry school, but an enterprising officer had a better idea. An officer believed the Army would benefit by sending the champ and other boxers to visit bases throughout the U.S. and Europe to demonstrate their fisticuff skills and take on all challengers. The plan was a huge success, and Louis entertained countless G.I.s for the next three years.

Louis followed a single rule with respect to his fights. He would not box in front of segregated audiences. Without much fanfare, Louis is credited with challenging racism and fighting segregation in the Army. He was discharged in 1945, holding the rank of technical sergeant.

Like his fellow veterans, the champ had to get used to civilian life again. He joined American Legion Post 45 in Louisville, Kentucky, and continued to box professionally, defending his title until 1949. Eventually, age and wear-and-tear ended his run in the ring. When he retired from boxing, his professional record included an astonishing 68 wins.

Boxing in the mid-20th century paid well for elite athletes, but not the windfalls found in today's market. It's estimated Louis generated nearly \$5 million in earnings over his 71-fight, nearly-12-year career, but reports suggest he saw only \$800,000 of it. He had bad luck as an investor, making ill-fated loans to family and friends. He was continually pursued by the Internal Revenue Service, as the agency claimed he had not fully declared his income on his tax returns. Desperate for money, Louis agreed to come out of retirement and fight undefeated Rocky Marciano in 1951. The "Italian Stallion" knocked out the former champ but sincerely apologized for it afterward in Louis's dressing room.

Louis left boxing behind for good. He tried professional wrestling, then became a boxing referee. He worked as a greeter at Caesar's Palace in Las Vegas. He had a brief run in Hollywood, appearing in a handful of movies and television shows.

Louis had a second sporting love after boxing: golf. As with the Army, he helped desegregate the game. He played in the 1952 San Diego Open, after prompting the PGA to remove its bylaw excluding Black players from membership.

On April 12, 1981, the former champ died of cardiac arrest in Las Vegas, at age 66. President Ronald Reagan - with whom Louis co-starred in "This is the Army" (1943) - promptly waived the rigid rules and regulations of Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia, and TSgt Joe Louis was fittingly laid to final rest with full military honors on April 21,1981.  $\sim$




