



There's a natural impulse to want to fast-forward to whatever is on the other side of these things. But these things, stacked on top of themselves, represent a big chunk of a life. 

#### **PANIC ATTACK**

Regarding the article in your October 24 issue entitled "Space Invaders" about Orson Welles radio version of H.G. Wells novel The War of the Worlds on October 30, 1938:

I remember that night and I remember that broadcast. I was 8 and in the fourth grade (I am now 95). We lived on the west side of Manhattan, only two blocks from the Hudson River, which separates New Jersey from New York. On that night, my father and I were in the living room with the radio on, while my sister and brother (twins, six years older and in high school) were doing their homework at the kitchen table. I don't remember what my mother was doing.

The program began with the music playing for a few minutes and then suddenly: "We interrupt this program with a special bulletin: MARTIANS HAVE LANDED IN NEW JERSEY! MARTIANS HAVE LANDED IN NEW JERSEY!"

I heard the announcement, but I didn't understand it. I didn't know what "Martians" were. But my father also heard it and believed it. The announcer continued with descriptions of heavy fighting between the invaders and American troops, saying the Martians had "death ray" weapons that were destroying everything in their path.

We lived on the fourth floor of a five-story walk-up. From our windows we could see the sky over New Jersey. My father looked and saw a reddish glow in the sky, which he said was from the battle below, not considering that if we looked any other night, we would have seen the same thing caused by the large neon signs on the riverbanks advertising Coca-Cola and other products.

As the broadcast continued, the announcer said the Martians would soon cross the Hudson and attack New York. When my father heard that, he told us to put our coats on. He declared, "We are going to my mother's. If we are going to die, we will all die together."

His mother – my grandmother – and my father's two unmarried brothers lived on the next street, a five-minute walk away. We put on our coats, and my sister and brother went down the stairs to the street. My mother and I were about to start down when my father heard, "You have been listening to a fictional version of 'The War of the Worlds."

He changed to a different station and heard no mention of a Martian invasion and realized the whole broadcast was fake. He sent me down to the street to tell my sister and brother to come back up.

As your article stated, this broadcast caused an uproar as thousands all over the country believed it. Orson Welles had to apologize for a too-realistic program.

## Cheers to the **Greatest Generation**

n March of 1945, James Zalud flew more than 7,000 miles from Kansas City to Tinian in the North Mariana Islands. As a pilot and navigator in the U.S. Army Air Corps, he made bombing runs from an airfield at Tinian in his B-29, according to his daughter, Landings resident Patty Brindle. After Zalud died in 2013 at the age of 91, Patty's sister Nancy made a fascinating discovery. While cleaning out her father's desk, Nancy found a stack of bills. She took the bills to a bank, where the teller said, "You might want to keep this one." The bill had more signatures on it than a popular kid's yearbook page.

Nancy contacted a friend with knowledge of military trivia, knickknacks, and lore. The friend identified the bill as a "Short Snorter," a makeshift membership card to an unofficial Air Corps drinking club. "Snort" was slang for a drink, and "short" indicated that it was below the usual measure for such beverages. According to legend, if a group of aviators descended on a bar and one of them was without his Short Snorter, he would cover the night's tab. As there was the possibility of being called on to fly at a moment's notice, the men would stick to lighter-than-normal nips.

The combination of gambling and imbibing became so popular that some crewmembers began calling each other Short Snorters. Besides helping to avoid paying a tab, a Short Snorter bill served as a keepsake to remember friends – particularly valuable given the danger of their

The B-29 bomber was first deployed at the end of 1944 and proved instrumental in ending the war. As the peace treaty was signed aboard the USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay, the sky overhead was filled with B-29s. "I remember that

day, as I was in one of those 29s," Zalud wrote World War II, a campaign was launched in an email to Patty.

Following his discharge in 1946, Zalud returned to college on the GI Bill, and graduated from Case-Western Reserve in Cleveland, Ohio. Taking a job with AT&T Long Lines, Zalud worked throughout the Midwest in a variety of management roles until his retirement in 1982.

Zalud seldom spoke of his military experience, never discussing it among family or friends. No doubt many of those stories would likely be interesting, perhaps even exciting, but they remain largely unknown. "His service really didn't affect our family,"

For almost 30 years, Zalud and his wife split their time between Wisconsin and Florida, until moving to California to be near family in 2009. Yet through every company transfer and relocation, Zalud's Short Snorter remained a cherished reminder of the men with whom he served.

to preserve such bills. In March of 2009, Thomas Sparks founded The Shorter Snorter Project, established in Washington "for educational purposes pertaining to short snorters." Part of its mission is "to illuminate the Short Snorter and those associated with the tradition and provide a means to educate the general public about these artifacts brought home from the war."

Many Short Snorter bills bear the names of those who held them, including one from June of 1942 belonging to Air Force General/Second Chief of Staff Hoyt Vandenburg, and another dated July of 1942 belonging to FDR aide Harry Hopkins. Two from January of 1943 feature the names of Flight Engineer D. Ray Comish and future U.S. Secretary of Commerce Averell Harriman.

In 2020, Sparks published a book called The Short Snorter Project: Still Keeping the Memories Alive, which features vintage photos of pilots, scans of their snorters, and much more trivia. Though Like many significant mementos from not available on Amazon, you can read it for



Remarkably, some Short Snorters are listed for sale on eBay and other auction sites. Though these bills have long since lost their value as de facto coupons for free liquor, they remain a proud symbol of the camaraderie among America's veterans.

t first glance, you may have read, "Respect the Cartilage." That would also make a fine article, and you should indeed take care of your connective tissue. However, this piece is about something en-

tirely different; something that is invisible with no exact dimensions. So why should we as Skidaway residents, especially golfers, respect something we can't see or define?

The curtilage is somewhat difficult to explain. It is, in the most basic legal terms, a small area outside a house that is considered private. It is always there. But it's not precisely recorded. Strange, isn't it?

The Fourth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution protects citizens from illegal searches and seizures from their government. The curtilage surrounding the house is often part of the ongoing legal debate about what is considered private. American courts have recognized and established that the curtilage is where the home's occupants have an expectation of privacy roughly equal to the space inside the home. Think of it as a small buffer area surrounding the home with a sign that says "Private. Don't come any closer."

The concept of a curtilage is not new at all. It appears to derive from old English law, where it was established that everything inside a moat or gate, no matter how vast the contained area, is curtilage and is resultantly private. U.S. courts have tried to define this invisible boundary in our modern times like this: If you have an open

field or yard behind your home, you have no expectation of privacy there. People are free to walk through it unless you build a fence. Your expectation of privacy increases within that area. The closer you get to the house, the

higher your expectation of privacy. For example, if you create a small garden or patio right behind your house, you have created an area with a much higher expectation of privacy from government agents, the general public, random snoopers and, I will argue, erratic golfers. There is no set distance of the curtilage area. It depends on the home and the area the homeowner has established as being a little more intimate than just the yard.

Full disclosure: I can be an erratic golfer. I have hit a few roofs in our neighborhood. I have landed in manicured backyards many times. With my awesome Ping driver (which my wife no longer allows me use), I have launched balls over homes into front yards where there is no golf course frontage at all. I find that both embarrassing and awesome at the same time.

I also own a home that has beautiful golf course frontage. I have many well-meaning golfers present in my yard almost every hour of every day. Living on a golf course, I expect that. We often make friendly eye contact, and I give them my It's-okay-look. However, in all my excursions outside the actual boundaries of the golf course, I never encroach the curtilage to retrieve my errant golf ball. In my view, if I had no legal right to be on that spot as a former government official,



Firmly defining your curtilage with a fence may not keep the neighbor from observing you, but it will definitely make it harder for them.

then I have no right to be there as a golfer. I respect the homeowner's curtilage whether they know they have one or not. This, I believe, is just simple respect for property and privacy.

Over the years, I have had a few bold golfers walk right up onto my deck to grab a ball. As a homeowner, that feels very invasive.

If the courts struggle to define the boundaries of the curtilage for law enforcement, then how am I to define it as a golfer? Here is the rule I use, for what it's worth. I consider a boundary of about three to five feet away from a house to be an intimate area of the house. This is widely accepted in law enforcement as a starting point. If I do not know that homeowner, then they certainly do not expect me to occupy that intimate boundary for any amount of time without an invitation. If they have taken pains to create a small garden, patio, or deck that extends beyond that, then I will not encroach. I will simply donate that rebellious golf ball to the homeowner. That golf ball obviously had bad spirits in it anyway. Good riddance.

In communities such as ours, the curtilage can serve as a boundary between the privacy of our homeowners and the rights of our golfers who are homeowners themselves. I guess you could respect the curtilage and the cartilage at the same time. Even better.

# Two Nurses Establish Local Chapter Of National Honor Guard

Turses honoring nurses." That is the simple but important mission of the Coastal Georgia Nurse Honor Guard, the local chapter of a national organization created to celebrate the lives of nurses.

The Coastal Georgia chapter was launched by two St. Joseph's/Candler co-workers and longtime friends, JJ Riley and Michele Roberts. This past August, the chapter celebrated its first anniversary.

"We heard about the National Nurses Honor Guard and attended their conference in May of 2024," Roberts says. "And we said, 'We've got to do this in Savannah."

There are hundreds of Nurse Honor Guard chapters across the country, and each is made up of volunteers. Any licensed nurse in good standing is invited to join. The Honor Guard is best known for the Nightingale Tribute, a beautiful and solemn ceremony conducted at a nurse's funeral or memorial service. This ritual named for the founder of modern nursing honors the nurse's life and career.

A central part of the ceremony involves a lamp, the enduring symbol of a nurse's calling. The ceremonial lamp references Florence Nightingale, who used a lamp throughout the night as she checked on wounded soldiers during the Crimean War in the 1850s. Later, it became a tradition to present a lamp to nursing graduates as they began their careers.

During the memorial ceremony, a Nightingale lamp is lit in the nurse's honor. Then, the nurse's name is called out as a request to report for duty. After the third call, the nurse is relieved of her nursing duties, and the lamp is extinguished.

"It's the final call for nurses who have served selflessly and dedicated their lives to the care of others," Riley explains. "The tribute is a message to these nurses: Your duties are done; your tasks are complete. You are going home."

The extinguished lamp is presented to the nurse's family as a cherished keepsake. These ceremonies are done at no cost to the families; the Honor Guard is a non-profit organization that provide these services through private donations.

Honor Guard nurses wear traditional white uniforms and caps, along with a special navy-blue cape with red lining. The cape is a reminder of nurses serving in wartime. It would help keep the nurses' uniforms clean and white, and the red lining helped soldiers identify nurses on the battlefield.

The Honor Guard celebrates living nurses, too. "Our chapter does services for nurses who are still alive, to honor their service to the nursing profession by celebrating with them at their retirement or a milestone birthday," Roberts says.

Building this organization has been a labor of love for Riley and group, and have worked tirelessly to grow the chapter over the past

Roberts. They started with a handful of members and a Facebook



year. This included the administrative tasks of securing their nonprofit status, establishing a bank account, and, most importantly, getting the word out.

After seeing the ceremony for the first time, nurses often approach Riley or Roberts to see how they can be a part of the chapter. Their enthusiasm matches how the two nurs-Guard. The group currently has 39 members and is continuing to grow as nurses are inspired to join.

"We have a lot of St. Joseph's/Candler nurses, of course," Roberts says. "But this chapter is for all nurses in this area. Some of our members are retired. Some, like II and I, are still working. We have nurses from all walks of life in this chapter. Where you work doesn't matter. This group unites all nurses."


The Nurse Honor Guard tradition originated in 2003 with the Kansas State Nurses Association, which sought to create a method of tribute like those for military members, police officers, and firefighters. The goal was to formally recognize a nurse's career of dedication and service.

The idea gradually spread among nurses beyond Kansas, gaining significant momentum in 2011 when an operating room nurse from Michigan, Julia Godby Murray, attended a presentation on the tribute ceremony. Inspired, she began to promote the concept through social media, and this outreach eventually led to the formation of the National Nurses Honor Guard Coalition, helping establish more than 200 chapters across the country. Each chapter is autonomous, but they all share the core mission of honoring the lives and careers of nurs-

For the families of the deceased nurses, the Honor Guard's ceremony provides a sense of pride and validation. The Nightingale Tribute serves as a powerful reminder of their loved one's commitment and compassion. For grieving families, the ceremony helps remind them that their loved one's contributions to the noble profession of nursing are valued and will not be forgotten. It also provides comfort to fellow nurses, who can pay their final respects to a colleague and friend.

What began in one state has become a national movement, with local chapters such as the one in Coastal Georgia, which covers Chatham, Bryan, and Liberty Counties.


