I heard muffled voices through our front door, loud enough to suggest they were sitting on our steps. A sweet Southern accent. One with a New York bite. The makings of a small group.

It happens. People walk by and coopt the stoop as a resting place. Typically, they move on after a few minutes. But these voices persisted. Eventually, I put the crossword puzzle on the floor beside my chair and stood to investigate the sound source.

One of our neighbors was sitting on the center step. Another was standing on the sidewalk. She looked up at me and flashed a broad smile. I didn't see Jenna until I turned my gaze left, where she was kneeling next to the opening underneath the stoop. Shifting my eyes to the brick walkway on the opposite side of the stoop from Jenna, I noticed the center-step-sitter's boyfriend, prone on the ground, bristle-end of a broom in his outstretched hands, handle probing the darkness under the steps.

I walked down the steps, past the sitting neighbor who was wearing a cat-that-ate-thecanary grin, and asked Jenna, "What's going on?"

Her response was non-verbal, as they often are. She cast her eyes towards the under-stoop void, pointed, and prompted me to look there. Expecting something sinister like a snake or a rat, I was surprised by a white orb of fluff, like the spilled contents of a bag of cotton balls. Then, the fluff moved.

The prone neighbor gently coaxed the fluff out of the opening on Jenna's side. Jenna extended her arms and corralled the mystery kitten. The standing neighbor lady said to me, "It looks like you have a new cat."

I half-smiled and answered quickly and definitively, "Absolutely not."

We humans adopt a high pitch when we address babies and domestic animals. The scene outside our front door featured a chorus of these falsetto tones. I retained my natural tenor. Soon, I was back inside with the



crossword.

The group did not disassemble, so it was difficult to concentrate on my Saturday leisure-work. Half-annoyed, I went back outside. "Bring her in; we'll have her checked; and we'll find her a permanent home."

"Really?"

"Really. But just for a day or two."

The hypothetical permanent home turned out to be our own.

Roughly two months ago, a nameless white Siamese-looking kitten, no bigger than the palm of an adult hand, joined our family. We searched and inquired for and about news of a little lost cat. None came. A comprehensive veterinary exam declared her healthy. Providence declared her ours.

We debated prospective monikers for days. Jenna proffered one that I embraced: Chinotto, which is a popular (and my favorite) Italian soda that tastes of the small, bitter citrus of the same name. Soon thereafter, Jenna started calling her "Kiki," a justifiable shorthand for her proper name, and cattier than a fizzy beverage brand. Kiki/Chinotto: Something for her, something for me. Kiki is maniacally active, much of the time. She runs away from us tauntingly in a perpetual game of hide-and-seek. Yet she stops scurrying regularly to roll onto one side, belly exposed, asking-without-asking for a tummy-rub. It's a thing that Mushu did for almost two decades when he was alive. Kiki looks a lot like Mushu, actually. Evidently, Kiki looks and acts like Cooey, too. Cooey was younger-Jenna's beloved cat.

"Absolutely not" has a funny way of acting as a placeholder on the way to, "Sure, let's figure it out together." When we do the latter – figure things out together – the results tend to be very good.

"Where did she come from?" Jenna has asked several times since June. The question is both rhetorical and asked-and-answered. She believes – we choose to believe – Kiki is a divine gift. Not in an immaculate-conception way, but one of the infinite everyday miracles God offers to those willing to see them as such. A breathing tribute to the love Mushu and Cooey gave and received and the lives they lived.

If the spilled contents of a bag of cotton balls was an accurate description when we found her, Kiki is at least two bags now. She's adorable and precocious and fully integrated into her forever home. Which is the happiest accident I can recall.



aurel Grove Cemetery is neither as glamorous as its sister at Bonaventure, nor as historic as its downtown ancestor Colonial Park. Laurel Grove is easy to miss, nestled at the far western end of Anderson Street, within sight of Interstate 16 just after the 37th Street ramp. Seemingly unassuming, Laurel Grove is a 19th Century treasure.

Sited on the former Springfield Plantation, Laurel Grove's name evokes the native laurel trees that once grew there. Envisioned as a cemetery as early as 1818, it was finally developed in 1850 and dedicated in 1852, just as Savannah's other burial grounds began to overflow. The old Colonial Cemetery, opened in 1750, had become a crowded, neglected public nuisance and a perceived health hazard in an era when citizens and doctors alike linked yellow fever to "miasmas" – bad vapors – emanating from the moldering dead.

Both Laurel Grove and Bonaventure emerged mid-century in a significant Victorian shift of attitudes towards cemeteries. They were no longer places to avoid; rather, they became fond, familial destinations. Reflecting the new concept of leisure time for a growing middle class, the rural cemetery movement located cemeteries outside of city centers and separate from church yards. Cemeteries became bucolic forests not just of gravestones but of landscaped vistas, venues for family picnics, and places for strolls, just for their own sake.

Laurel Grove was established as two cemeteries: One for white

Savannahians – Laurel Grove North – and the other for people of color – Laurel Grove South. While Laurel Grove South boasts its own impressive tombstones, monuments, and mausoleums, it predictably falls far behind Laurel Grove North for imposing funereal statuary and art. The comparative lack of physical grandeur, however, does not diminish the presence of hundreds of notable African Americans, whose pantheon will be the subject of a future article.


Laurel Grove North is a museum of Victorian art, probably the most extensive and complete in the area, because as the cemetery's popularity gained traction with Savannahians, its plots were prolifically subscribed and the cemetery largely built out by the 20th Century. Left behind were the skulls and crossbones, primitive winged souls, and spare inscriptions of the 18th Century. Laurel Grove's tombs comprise a pageant of Victorian beauty in artistic representations such as broken trees or truncated columns indicating lives cut short, weeping willows bowing low over prostrate mourners, and urns representing the dust and ashes to which the dead return.

Posh memorials preside over a Who's Who of Savannah's Antebellum elite. John Macpherson Berrien, a Savannah transplant whose life probably warrants multiple historical markers, is buried at Laurel Grove. A U.S. senator representing Georgia, Berrien stepped fully onto the national stage as Attorney General in the Andrew Jackson administration. As the nation's top law enforcement official, he prosecuted high-level officers for embezzlement of public funds. He ar-

gued against the emancipation of the Africans on board the illegal slave ship, *The Antelope*, famously saying that slavery "lay at the foundation of the Constitution." He returned to Savannah in retirement, joining founding members of the Georgia Historical Society and serving as its first president.

James Moore Wayne was a Savannah native, the first to serve on the U.S. Supreme Court. Before going to Washington, Wayne served in active duty during the War of 1812, a conflict that saw enthusiastic support in the South. A respected attorney, Wayne served as



Buried nearby is Wayne's protégé, William Washington Gordon, the founder of the Central of Georgia Railway and Banking Company. This is the same Gordon who is lauded by the handsome monument – replete with its railroad bas-relief carvings and the name GORDON – in Wright Square. Although establishing a transportation and finance institution may not seem all that unusual today, Gordon's company was nearly single-handedly responsible for giving Georgia the means to compete with South Carolina in the all-important transport of cotton from the upcountry to the port of Savannah. His railroad and

bank transformed Georgia commerce in the 1830s and 1840s.

Laurel Grove Cemetery reveals the great tragedy of American history: the Civil War. Writ large with the graves of hundreds of Confederates (and even one Union general), the cemetery reminds visitors of the conflict that ended chattel slavery yet cost hundreds of thousands of lives. Francis Bartow, the firebrand who defied Georgia's governor and left the state to fight with Confederate troops in Virginia, dying at the first Battle of Bull Run, is buried at Laurel Grove. Another Confederate warrior is Lafayette McLaws, who died a natural death in 1897. The two men are linked in historical memory by their matching busts, which flank the Civil War Memorial in Forsyth Park.

Historical memory abounds in Laurel Grove's Gettysburg section where more than 700 markers commemorate Savannah's fallen, casualties of the 1864 confrontation in Pennsylvania that some call the climax of the Civil War. Presiding over these graves is the 1870s Silence, one of two allegorical figures removed from the original Confederate Memorial (Silence and her sister Judgment were unpopular figures when the memorial was first unveiled and were soon sent to cemeteries, replaced by a bronze Confederate soldier). During the 2020 Black Lives Matter protests, which proceeded in relative peace in downtown Savannah, vandals desecrated Silence, breaking off the finger she held to her lips and spray-painting "Silent no more." Mayor Van Johnson condemned the act, declaring that cemeteries are sacred, no matter how compelling the cause for protest.

At the time, Laurel Grove marched into the 20th Century, receiving such notable Savannah women as Anna Davenport Raines, a founding

member of the United Daughters of the Confederacy and a lifelong champion of Lost Cause ideology. Florence Martus, the woman who spent her life on Cockspur Island where her father was the lighthouse keeper and for decades waved to ships entering and leaving the port of Savannah, is interred at Laurel Grove. So is Juliette Gordon Low, granddaughter of William Washington Gordon and founder in 1912 of the Girl Scout movement in the U.S. According to her precise instructions prior to her death in 1927, she is buried in her beloved Girl Scout uniform.

Although Laurel Grove is not yet full and receives new burials each year, it serves as a collection of 19th Century history in an important Southern port city. It exemplifies the Victorian-era rural cemetery movement, with its then-exurban location. It puts on full display the exquisite art and iconography of an era that viewed death differently from earlier generations. And it serves as the final resting place for a century of Savannahians whose lives and legacies mirror – for better and for worse – the achievements, sensibilities, and sometimes tragic mistakes of their generations.





ummer evokes images of sun-drenched days and carefree leisure for young people. However, within the bustling halls of St. Joseph's/Candler, a different picture has emerged this season. The youth haven't been on vacation; they have been actively engaged, getting a feel for the evolving healthcare landscape and the vital role the next generation can play in it. Their dedication, curiosity, and early exposure to the medical field comprise a critical investment in the future of patient

One heartwarming initiative that perfectly encapsulates this forward-looking vision is the Teddy Bear Clinic, hosted by second-year

students from the Medical College of Georgia (MCG) – Savannah Campus. These aspiring physicians visited The Children's House, a daycare on the Candler Hospital campus, to provide "check-ups" for the children's beloved teddy bears and other stuffed animals. Eager to participate, the young patients became "caregivers" themselves, assisting the medical students in examining their teddies' eyes, ears, and bodies, ensuring every stuffed friend received a clean bill of health.

"Our goal is to help children understand that medical visits don't have to be scary," explains Akshara Jayaraman, an MD candidate at MCG who organized the clinic. "This way, they get to join in and be caregivers, demystifying the healthcare experience from an early

Beyond alleviating childhood anxieties, the clinic offers a valuable learning opportunity for the MCG students themselves. It provides a practical platform for them to hone their communication skills, translating complex medical concepts into age-appropriate language, and fostering empathetic interactions with young patients.

"Volunteer events expose us to different fields," Jayaraman adds. "After being with those adorable kiddos, a couple more of us are leaning towards pediatrics."

The students who participated in the Teddy Bear Clinic were among the first to start their education at the four-year MCG Savannah campus, which opened its doors a year

Jillian Schmid joined the program with a clear aspiration - a career in medicine. possibly specializing in dermatology. "I was looking for something I could do at my age that would get me involved in the medical field," she explains. "This way I

could test my interest. I love this program because I've been able to do so many different things. I'm on the rehab floor at Candler, and I didn't know I'd be interested in it, but it's been great."

Schmid praises the welcoming environment created by the St. Joseph's/Candler team. "Everyone here is so nice," she says. "They seem to really love that we are here to help."

Rising senior Elise Stuchell found great value in the advice and mentorship shared by St. Joseph's/Candler co-workers. "The co-workers in OB/GYN would tell me about their careers and how they found them, and they would ask me about what I thought I might want to do," Stuchell recalls.

Stuchell joined the program to gain practical insight into work in a hospital setting. "There are a bunch of different areas that you can work in as a volunteer," she notes. "You can do hands-on assisting with nurses, or you can help in the offices. You get to see every little moving part. It was a great experience."

the profound impact of this expansion. "This is a great day for our city, for our region and for our state, but most importantly for all the future generations of patients who eventually will be treated by today's medical students."


Dr. David C. People are at the heart of all war stories. But places play their part in history, too.

ONE WAR, THREE CREEKS

Por troops in combat, an adequate water supply is critical – to drink, wash wounds, or to cool off. During the American Civil War, troops often marched long distances, and wells were scarce, did not contain much water, or were not clean enough to drink.

Not only were rivers, creeks, and ponds important sources of drinking water, but they also served as natural defensive barriers. Bridges formed "pinch points," forcing troops to cluster, making them easier targets. Soldiers attempting to cross open water were dangerously exposed, and footing in a shallow creek could be treacherous. Firearms often relied on black powder and keeping it dry could prove the difference between life or death. Three creeks became especially important during the Civil War.

BULL RUN, VIRGINIA

The first major battle of the Civil War was fought at Bull Run Creek near Manassas, Virginia, about 40 miles south of Washington, D.C. When Confederate forces left Richmond in July of 1861 and headed due north, federal military leaders – including commander-in-chief Abraham Lincoln – feared an assault on the nation's capital. The Federal Home Guard provided security for the city, a soft and easy duty that rendered many of the men overweight and out of shape. Despite the condition of the troops, they were deployed to a farm near Manassas, probably draining their canteens dry of water during the hot summer march.

Upon hearing the news of the impending battle, many civilians in and around Washington packed picnic lunches, hitched up their buggies, and headed south, expecting to view an easy victory for the Yankees. But when they arrived at the Manassas farm with Bull Run

Creek flowing through it, the view was anything but pleasant. The battlefield became littered with casualties from both sides, including Gen. Francis Bartow, CSA, who is laid to rest in Savannah's Laurel Grove Cemetery (*see page 10*). Eventually, the South dominated the fight, and the first battle of Bull Run was considered a Confederate victory.

ANTIETAM CREEK, MARYLAND

An even deadlier Civil War battle was fought next to Antietam Creek, which flows close to the small town of Sharpsburg, Maryland. It is of historical significance as Gen. Robert E. Lee's first attempt to invade Northern territory, resulting in the costliest day of the war – almost 23,000 casualties from the two sides combined.

The battle began on July 21, 1862, with a deadly barrage of Northern artillery on a cornfield occupied by Southern troops. On the southeast side of town, Union troops led by Maj. Gen. Ambrose E. Burnside had been trying to cross Antietam Creek since mid-morning, stymied by 500 Georgia sharpshooters firing from the woods on the opposite bank. Around 1 p.m., the Northerners finally crossed the bridge and advanced up surrounding high ground. After a two-hour lull in the battle, Union troops reformed and advanced up the hill, driving the remaining Confederates back towards the main conflict near Sharpsburg. However, the timely arrival of Maj. Gen. A.P. Hill's division pushed Burnside's forces away from Sharpsburg, driving them back to the heights above the bridge.

After heavy back-and-forth fighting all day, the flow of battle swung

in the Union's favor, until ending late in the afternoon with Yankee troops on three sides of the 10,000-acre battlefield. In the middle of the night, Lee led his crippled army back across the Potomac into Virginia, to fight again another day.

EBENEZER CREEK, GEORGIA

In the fall of 1864, Union Maj. Gen. William T. Sherman conducted his "March to the Sea" from Atlanta to Savannah. During the 285-mile trek, his troops destroyed many of the farms and plantations along the way, liberating several hundred slaves. However, the freed slaves remained fearful of their previous "masters," and many followed Sherman's army for protection. Meanwhile, a small but determined Confederate cavalry unit followed in the distance, remaining safely out of range.


Eventually, Sherman's army arrived at Ebenezer Creek, about 30 miles outside Savannah. As the last of the troops crossed over the bridge of the fast-flowing, rain-swollen Ebenezer Creek, Sherman ordered the bridge to be burned, to hinder the following Confederates. Tragically, this left the former slaves behind without any safe refuge from the advancing Southern soldiers. Many of the former slaves plunged into the creek, but most could not swim very well and struggled to reach the opposite bank, almost 50 yards distant. Very few made it, and quickly the creek was filled with floating dead bodies. Worse yet, many of the remaining slaves who fled into the woods died from exposure or inadequate food supply, making the incident at Ebenezer Creek near Savannah a double tragedy. The location has been designated as a historical site, with a memorial sign installed there.


